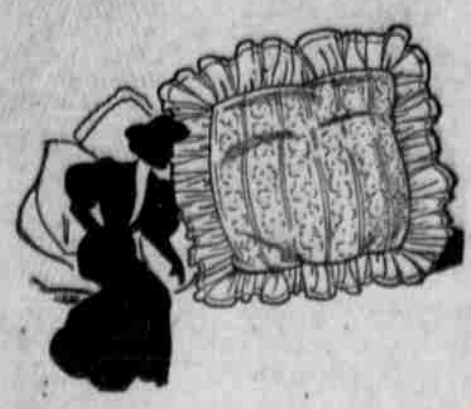

MARION COUNTY VOTE IS LIGHT

According to unofficial count nearly 1000 more votes were cast in Marion county for United States senator last June than for presidential electors this week. The total vote for United States senator was 7001 while the total vote for presidential electors as far as is known is not more than 5800. The vote in six small precincts is yet unknown and cannot be determined until the official count is completed this evening. Judge Taft's plurality in Marion county now stands at about 1500 with little chance that it will exceed 1600. The best figures obtainable give Taft 3629 and Bryan 2156 or a plurality for Taft of 1473.
