

# DOMESTIC TROUBLES OF RICH LUMBERMAN PROVE SENSATION

Eureka, Cal., Nov. 6.—Charging that her husband is insane and that he will soon have to be confined in an asylum, Mrs. J. B. Watkins, wife of an aged millionaire lumberman, is today preparing a defense to a charge of attempt to murder, filed against her yesterday by her husband. Mrs. Watkins is out of jail on \$45,000 bail and declares that she will adduce some startling testimony at her preliminary hearing tomorrow.

Watkins caused the arrest of his wife after a long series of domestic troubles between the two. He charges that on October 23 she tried to shoot him and that the failure of the cartridge to explode was all that saved his life. Watkins says that his wife tried to make away with him on several occasions. He says that she was intent on getting his millions and one time tried to bribe his chauffeur to run him over a cliff in an automobile.

Both Morse and Curtis arose early at the Tombs prison this morning and ate hearty breakfasts at 6 o'clock. They appeared in the court room promptly at 8 o'clock.

Mrs. Morse greeted her husband calmly. Neither showed much emotion. The meeting of Curtis and his wife was very different, as Mrs. Curtis is now a complete nervous wreck. The deposed banker almost wept as he sprang to his wife's open arms. Judge Hough, in passing sentence, declared that Curtis was under the influence of a stronger mind, and said that Curtis' efforts to reform conditions were blocked by the bank's supine board of directors.

The room was crowded when Judge Hough took his place on the bench. Morse and Curtis sat with two deputy sheriffs in the jury box. Both were greatly agitated.

Mrs. Curtis scarcely able to control herself, sat with her sister, Mrs. Gordon, and Colonel R. M. Thompson. Mrs. Morse was seated with her husband's sons, Harry and Ben. When Judge Hough announced that he would suspend sentence in the case of Curtis, Mrs. Curtis collapsed and fainted. She was borne unconscious from the room.

Morse did not flinch when his sentence was passed. His face showed but little expression and he did not move from his attitude. There was not the slightest trace of emotion about the man. With his wife, sons and counsel, Morse conversed in the marshal's office until noon, when he was returned to the tombs.

Morse was sentenced to serve the 15 years in the federal prison at Atlanta, Ga. Morse was cheered by hundreds as he left the building. Morse's wife had recovered and she to was loudly cheered. They hurried to their home.

Counsel for Morse this afternoon obtained a writ of error from Judge Lacombe in the United States circuit court. This acts as a temporary stay until application for bail can be made.

# EARTHQUAKE IN GERMANY CAUSES APPREHENSION

Plauen, Germany, Nov. 6.—A violent earthquake shook this city today and threw the people into a panic. Houses were rocked by the seismic disturbance and people fled into the streets in terror. The shock lasted several minutes. Late this afternoon the people had refused to re-enter their houses fearing a repetition of the shock. Sharp explosions, and a heavy rumbling noise accompanied the earthquake, which was the culminating shock of a series of smaller quakes that have shook the city for the past week. The shock today was the most serious that has been felt in this section of Germany for years. The temperature of the Medical Springs here was increased 15 degrees in a few seconds and the people are afraid that a general disaster may overtake them.

# CHINESE CHILDREN SING FOR ROOSEVELT

Washington, Nov. 6.—Nine diminutive Chinese children are preparing today to return to their homes in San Francisco after having accomplished the object of their visit to the capital by singing American songs for President Roosevelt. Each possesses an autograph picture of the chief executive and proud recollections of this entertainment and at Philadelphia where the chorus has been attending a meeting under the auspices of the Methodist church. All of the children are girls with the exception of one, a 9-year-old boy. None is more than 13 years of age. They are the pick of the Oriental rescue home in San Francisco, where Chinese orphan children are rescued from the slums and educated.

The youngsters sang "My Country 'Tis of Thee" and conversed with the President. The little boy delighted the President by remarking during the interview: "When I was in Lincoln I was for Bryan, but here I am for Taft."

# SPEEDY CHAUFFEUR LEAVES POLICEMAN BEHIND

New York, Nov. 6.—Jailed for exceeding the speed law, Ellis H. Kulp, a chauffeur today has two similar charges pending against him, after conviction yesterday of escaping from an arresting officer, who had arrested him for another similar offense. The total result today is a sentence against him of 15 or 20 days in the Tombs prison. Kulp was employed as a demonstrator with an automobile firm when he made his first sensational speed record. He had a wealthy merchant and three women in the machine on a demonstration trip when Motorcycle Sergeant Nerney told him he was under arrest for speeding. Kulp turned on the power, and the machine began a dizzy career that left the policeman in the rear. The automobile was not stopped until the merchant compelled Kulp to allow himself and the three hysterical women to leave the vehicle. Kulp was arrested for speeding in another instance, was recognized by Nerney, and additional charges of speeding and escaping arrest were brought against him.

# MUST STAND TRIAL FOR THREATENING LYNCHING

Valdez, Alaska, Nov. 6.—Seven men are to be tried next week at Valdez for the attempted lynching of J. E. Kennedy at Lake Creek near Cook inlet last fall. The trouble arose over the reported theft of \$2300 in gold dust from one of the miners. Kenney was accused of faking the dust. A posse consisting of Ed. Cone, D. McManus, T. D. Ellixson, Frank Dunn, Frank Churchill, Chas. Harper, A. R. Young and Sam Wagner, strung Kenney up to a tree and threatened to hang him unless he returned the gold. Kenney insisted on his innocence although he was left hanging until nearly dead, and the men finally released him. In addition to this criminal action against the lynchers Kenney has filed a civil suit asking for \$25,000 damages. Only five members of the posse have been arrested.

# FIRE-SURROUNDS HOME OF MACKEY

Roslyn Long Island Nov. 6.—Blackened ground and charred stumps today mark four acres of magnificent woodland that were burned last night in a fire that threatened to demolish the stately country home of Clarence B. Mackey, president of the Postal Telegraph Company, at Harbor Hill. The mansion was saved from destruction by

the work of Mackey and neighbors. The flames were discovered near midnight, and Mackey, at the head of a body of volunteer firemen, composing neighbors and servants, turned out in the biting cold to fight the fire. Their work prevented the house from catching, but the flames in the trees spread despite their efforts.

In the meantime the Highland fire company hastened to the scene, and early this morning the flames were extinguished, after four acres had been devastated.
