## RAILWAY FRANCHISE IS PASSED

At a special meeting of the city council last evening, the franchise of the Portland Railway Light & Power company, over which there has been a long dispute, passed with a few important amendments.

The matter was examined in sections by the council with Councilman A. N. Moores in the chair and Mayor Rogers on the floor, and after each division had been carefully considered, they were passed up to the city attorney for approval. A motion by Alderman Radcliff to appoint Low, Elliott and Fraser as a committee to also make a final inspection of the franchise and make a final report was passed.

A night car for depot service was not included in the franchise, and Alderman Greenbaum made a motion to amend this section and was seconded by Alderman Radcliff, but the motion was not adopted.

An insert of another amendment taking in a portion of Twelfth street was added to the franchise.

An amendment was made in section 5 to provide for the operation of cars until 9:40 at night instead of 8:40 as proposed in the draft franchise provided by the company.

Alderman Radcliff made an objection to section 9 of the proposed right-of-way document where it gives the company the privilege of removing shade trees, dogging holes and placing poles and installing wires in front of any property they so desire, but the council permitted it to pass after a lengthy discussion.

In the bill rendered by the electric company there was no provision for transfers included.

Mayor Rodgers offered an amendment to the franchise licensing the cars \$15 per year for operation. This amendment was approved.

City Attorney Walter Keyes now has the extensive document in hand and will report on it at the next meeting of the council.

### HAINS EXPOSE CAUSES SHAKE-UP

New York, Nov. 6.—Army circles here are agog with excitement today following the announcement of the war department that the military band at Fort Hamilton is to be moved to Fort Hancock, at Sandy Hook. It is stated today that this is but the first of a series of shake-ups that will follow as the result of the exposure of the gay life at the fort, in the testimony in the Hains-Annis case, and which will result in Fort Hamilton being rated as a secondary post.

It is known here that a shake-up of the commanding officers is contemplated from Lieutenant Colonel Henry H. Ludlow down. One of the

officers at the fort is authority for the statement that the war department contemplates taking from the fort all its social life, and leaving it stripped of everything but a few regiments, and the barest requirements for the work of the fort.

Hayes, grand master workman of the Knights of Labor, a body not affiliated with the American Federation of Labor, today declared that Gompers and his associates exceeded their authority, in taking the federation into politics. It is probable that there will be a warm discussion when the federation meets at Denver.
