COURT HOUSE NEWS

The county commissioners' court is now in session and are busily engaged in checking up the many bills and attending to other business coming in daily.

An injunction suit has been filed in circuit court department No. 2, by the Pocatello Mercantile company against Eva E. Mombert and J. Mombert to compel a settlement for \$659.94, being a sum yet due the Mercantile company on a payment for goods purchased by the defendants at Pocatello and on which judgment was given by the circuit court in a suit to recover. The complaint alleges that after paying a portion of the judgment rendered, the plaintiff by the court, the defendant sold the property upon which the attachment was filed and moved to this city; that he purchased more property here under the name of his wife; that a writ on judgment was issued against the Marion county property and sent to the sheriff here, but that the writ was returned to the plaintiff unsatisfied. The Mercantile company now asks the court to permit further proceeding against the defendant notwithstanding that the property is in the name of his wife.

In the equity case of Z. T. Bogard vs. A. Barban Judge Galloway overruled the judgment asked, giving his opinion that there were not sufficient facts in the case to constitute a cause of action. Attorneys Carson & Brown appear for the plaintiff and E. P. Morcom and G. G. Bingham for the defendant.

Mary M. Risher was granted a decree by Judge Galloway yesterday afternoon against her husband, Harry W. Risher, in divorce proceedings. Carey F. Martin appeared as her attorney for the plaintiff.

In the matter of John Wolfard, et al., vs. Teddy Wolfard, et al., a suit in equity, Judge Galloway heard the argument and handed down a decision authorizing and ordering the property in question sold to quiet title.

A complaint was filed in the circuit court this morning by Attorney George G. Bingham for a firm by the name of Dunham, Fletcher & Coleman against Geo. W. Case, of Butteville, to recover \$835 on a promissory note which the complaint alleges was tendered them by Case, and which he failed to pay.

Business is again opening up at the city jail. Judge Moores this morning listened to the reasons and whyfores of four tenants, and gave three of them a short space of time

to put themselves on the outside of the city while one will have a little stay-over of two days and a half. R. Roberts, who was placed in the city lock-up a few days ago for being too frisky with the bottle, and who alleges he was robbed of \$30 on the night he was arrested, was given a hearing, but he could place the blame on no one regarding the theft, and Judge Moores had him returned to the resting place to think the matter over for a few days.

MOST DESPERATE FOOTBALL GAME OF THE SEASON

Will be Played Saturday Where Salem and Eugene High Schools Meet to Settle an Old Rivalry

On Saturday (tomorrow) the big annual football contest between Salem and Eugene high schools takes place in this city on Willamette field. This game marks the climax toward which both of these teams have been working since the opening of the season. No doubt the largest crowd will be out Saturday to see this game that has been out for a number of years. The Salem high school students are preparing to go on masse and occupy a section of the grand stand. A good rooters' club has been organized which will back their team to the finish.

Eugene high school is running an excursion for the game, and over 100 visitors are expected to accompany their team, also with an organized rooters' club to vie with the Salemites.

This game has been firmly established as an annual affair, and the big game of the season for these two leading Willamette valley high schools. In previous games Eugene seems to have been a trifle in the lead, but neither team has ever defeated the other on their home field. In 1905 the two teams played a tie game in Salem, and later in the season Eugene won at Eugene. In 1906 Salem won at Salem, and again later was defeated at Eugene. Last year Eugene carried off the victory on the Eugene field, and tomorrow will tell what the 1908 score will be. These scores show honors divided pretty evenly.

Eugene's high school is reported to have the strongest team they have ever turned out. They have had hard practice the entire season under the able coaching of George Huggs, of "Oregon" fame, and have the further advantage of bucking the U. of O. team occasionally and picking up valuable hints there and absorbing a little of the intense football spirit which always surrounds a large university. Eugene will outweigh Salem by an average to the man of six or eight pounds.
