Ward signed the death certificate giving this as the cause, and later an autopsy was performed on the body by Surgeon J. R. Clark, after Gibson had made a statement to the police.

Dr. Clark avers that the septicaemia resulted from a bungling criminal operation, and Dr. Ward may have to answer to the charge of falsifying a death certificate, if this is true.

The autopsy will hinge upon the determination of the technical point as to what condition was responsible for the septicaemia, which is admitted to have resulted in the girl's death.

Young Gibson is in jail. He says that he intended to marry the girl to right the wrong he admits.

Frank P. Van Vlack, father of Frank P. Van Vlack, father of whose death in San Francisco this week has caused the arrest of two physicians on charges of malpractice, lives in Salem, is divorced from the mother of Vesta Van Vlack, is remarried, and just now is under indictment for perjury in connection with divorce proceedings. The father is not familiar with love affair between his daughter and James Gib-

son, as the scene of those amours is set at Cove.

Mr. Van Vlack remembers James Gibson only as a lad 14 years of age, when his youngest daughter, and James Gibson were children together at Cove. About 14 years ago Van Vlack moved his family from Cove to Salem, where subsequently Mr. Van Vlack secured a divorce from the mother of Vesta, and remarried.

Not more than two years ago Mrs. Van Vlack went to Cove, and, in her absence, her husband fled suit for divorce on the ground of desertion. Mrs. Van Vlack appeared before the grand jury this fall, and her former husband was indicted for perjury.

Van Vlack is under \$1000 bonds to appear for trial on the charge of perjury at the next term of court, which will be in January. He is a carpenter by occupation, and is nearly 65 years old. Since the divorce proceedings Vesta Van Vlack has made her home with her mother and older brother at Cove.

She also has an older married sister living in Salem.

"The news of my daughter's death comes as a great shock to me," said the father, "as I did not know my daughter had left home. I had asked her many times to come to Salem and attend school, and had promised her either a home here or to place

her in school wherever she should wish to go. I have never seen Gibson since he was a youngster. She was 16 years of age and Gibson must have been about 37 years old. He was a carpenter at Cove.

"I heard nothing about what disposition of the remains has been arranged for, except that they are being detained at San Francisco pending the investigation."

Before the two left for Cove, says Mr. Van Vlack, requests were made for his consent to the marriage, but neither he nor the mother would give it because they thought the daughter was too young. That was all the father, in Salem, knew of the misfortune, until the news of the death reached him at Salem.

FRISCO'S CITY HALL

DOMES TO COME DOWN

San Francisco, Nov. 7.—The great dome of the fire-ridden and dismantled city hall, which has stood for more than two years as a monument of the great disaster, will soon be razed to the ground according to the plans of the Abbitt company, the contractors who have successfully bid on the work of removal. The company began its preparations for the work of tearing down the tower and dome today.

The first proposal for the demolition of the city hall met with a

storm of sentimental protest. Many who had looked upon the dome as typical of San Francisco in its withstanding of the forces of the earthquake and fire, asked the courts to prevent its destruction.

The court yesterday however modified its restraining order and allowed the board of public works to let the contractor for razing the dome to the lowest bidder. The rest of the building must stand until the case has been decided.

The Abbitt company will pay \$7500 for the privilege of wrecking the dome and must complete the work within six months.

FIND CHARRED BODIES OF ENTOMBED MEN

Benton, Ill., Nov. 7.—Lying in hot coals, which had burned the bodies beyond recognition, the remains of Patrick Dally and George Reed, miners who were entombed in the Rend collieries were recovered today. The men evidently had been overcome by gas, and it is not thought they suffered from the burns. Hope for two others entombed was abandoned today.

Leslie Carter, who was cut off in the will of his father because of his fidelity to his mother, has begun suit to break the will.
