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CANNON ASSURED OF SPEAKERSHIP

Chicago, Ill., Nov. 9.—Speaker Cannon of the house of representatives met several congressmen from the west today in a discussion of the tariff revision issue. Cannon was in conference with National Chairman Hitchcock all day yesterday and it is believed that this was discussed exclusively.

The Republican national headquarters here were closed last night. The last official announcement to be given out was that 213 Republicans have been elected to the house for the next session of congress and that a large majority of these congressmen are pledged to support Speaker Cannon.

One of the leaders who has been following the fight against Cannon said today that it would not materialize on the floor of the house and that Cannon would be re-elected by an unanimous vote of the Republicans in the house.

Cannon is expected to leave tomorrow for the east for a conference with the house committee on ways and means and it is thought that the revision of the tariff is the topic to be discussed.

Cannon said today that he is certain of re-election as speaker.

Superintendent's Report.

I have the following matters for your consideration at this meeting: My observations thus far lead me to believe that the instruction in music and drawing as carried on in the schools this year is of a high order.

I believe that the Salem schools should prepare an exhibit to be sent to the Alaska-Yukon exposition, and that the board should authorize the superintendent to do so.

Mr. Joel Hewitt has been employed by the superintendent to do certain carpenter work authorized to be done by the board.

The increase of high school attendance in February will necessitate a re-arrangement of the seating in the assembly, and the purchase of 69 additional desks, and two backs.

The increased attendance mentioned will add five or more additional class periods. These can not be handled by the present teaching force even though the principal teach all of his time, which is impossible. I am therefore asking that the board authorize the employment of an additional instructor for the high school, to begin on February 12.

Various methods of bringing about the defeat of Chamberlain are under discussion. One plan favorably considered is to have the Republicans in counties which did not go for Chamberlain to prepare a petition urging their senators and representatives to vote for a Republican. The supposition is that Fulton may be selected in event of Chamberlain being turned down, although the name of Theodore B. Wilcox and others have been mentioned as the possible beneficiaries.

JUDGE STEPHEN A. LOWELL'S OPEN LETTER TO THE OREGONIAN

Although the United States senate is the one ambition in life for Judge Stephen A. Lowell of Pendleton, Judge Lowell declines to be elected through broken pledges or disregarded laws in the following stirring letter to the Oregonian of Portland:

Pendleton, Or., Nov. 6, 1908.

"To the Editor: I notice in your issue of this morning in an article discussing the senatorship, mention of my name as among several Republicans who may possibly receive consideration at the coming session of the legislature. I do not know that the matter requires any attention, but I desire to go on record while the fight is young and to say that while it is the ambition of my life to represent Oregon in the federal senate, I do not care to reach the high station over a pathway of broken pledges or disregarded laws and I want neither silence nor word nor act of mine to influence any member of the legislative assembly to violate his conscience or his word.

"I opposed Statement No. 1 in the primary campaign with such vigor and intelligence as I could command, believing it unwise, impolitic and foreign to the form of government under which we live, but it is now the law of the state, made such by the majority vote of the people, and every law should be obeyed.

"I speak only for myself, and do not assume to be the conscience of party or the mentor of the legislature.

REAL ESTATE DEALER FACES BIGAMY CHARGE

San Francisco, Nov. 9.—Leroy Leggett, known also as Leroy Stewart, a prosperous real estate operator in this city, is facing a charge of bigamy sworn out against him by Mrs. Martha Stewart today. The woman says she found herself addressed "My Dear Husband" in her husband's coat and that that led to an investigation that led her to believe her husband guilty of bigamy.

Mrs. Stewart, or Leggett says that further search among her husband's papers disclosed a marriage certificate issued in Boone county, Iowa, in 1896, recording Leggett's marriage to Mrs. Ollie Leggett of Oakland. This marriage has never been dissolved, says the woman.

The real estate man was arrested late Saturday night and the complaints were sworn to this morning. Mrs. Stewart has placed the marriage certificate of both her husband's marriages in the hands of the police and he will have to explain.

KETCHEL CONFIDENT OF WINNING LOST LAURELS

San Francisco, Nov. 9.—Billy Papke, world's champion welterweight fighter and Stanley Ketchel former champion who will try to win back his laurels, are both in training today for their Thanksgiving day fight. Papke started training at San Rafael yesterday and Ketchel opened his headquarters at Colma. Both men have started work with a will.

Papke is the center of interest with the fans. He had never been seen in action here before yesterday and his camp was crowded with those eager to see how the "Illinois Thunderbolt" handles himself. All were satisfied.

Papke fought two rattling rounds with "Chicago Jack" Gardner and Charlie Miller, each of whom are in the heavyweight division and he pummeled these men about the ring at will.

Ketchel is confident that he can win back the laurels he lost to Papke at Los Angeles and says that he will not be careless enough to let the eastern fighter hit him so early in the game. He says that carelessness is all that lost him the fight the last time they met and that he will win this time.

SIXTH BREAK IN RED BLUFF JAIL

Red Bluff, Cal., Nov. 9.—Sheriffs of the surrounding counties were notified today by the local authorities to look out for Garfield Ruth and John Williams who sawed their way out of a cell in the Trinity county jail last evening. The jail break is the sixth within a year in the Trinity county jail and it is intimated that a searching investigation will follow.

The two men, Ruth awaiting trial on a charge of grand larceny and Williams for alleged burglary sawed the lock off their cell door during the afternoon and after supper, swung the door open and escaped. Their departure was not discovered until an hour afterward and a posse was sent in pursuit.

Among the prisoners who could have taken advantage of the break were Deputy Game Warden Bond and Carpenter, who are being held on charges of murdering an Indian hunter. This is the third time these men have refused to avail themselves of a chance to escape.
