attitude and say that it hurts the islands and keeps tourists away. They are preparing an appeal to Washington today for an order commanding Sperry to give his men shore liberty.

The government officials are on the most friendly terms with Admiral Sperry and are trying to hold down the merchants who seem to be in the lead of the movement to force matters to a crisis through an appeal to Washington.

Many of the business men here have advanced money for the celebration and want to see something done. They do not stop to think that orders have been issued by Secretary of the Navy Metcalf that no sailor of the Atlantic fleet is to be allowed shore liberty while there is danger. They point to the fact that the regular Asiatic squadron men are allowed on shore.

There was cholera at Amoy and Tokio they say and the American fleet is discriminating against a home port when the men are not allowed to land here.

Admiral Sperry takes the attitude that one unnecessary death among the men of the fleet would be too dear a price to pay for any celebration that could be given and he steadfastly refuses to allow the men ashore as long as he thinks there is danger from cholera.

County Court.

The county Court adjourned last Saturday afternoon, and the docket for this session covers numerous matters presented by Marion county people.

The coroner's inquest verdict upon the body of Estella S. Timmons, who was killed by her husband, C. Y. Timmons, was approved.

Regarding the lien against the land of J. C. Voget, the district attorney made a motion to strike out the complaint, which was granted.

In the matter of establishing a free ferry boat at Newburg, for which H. B. Gearin tendered a petition, the court granted the request and the toll system which is now practiced by the ferry people will be discontinued.

The petition of Victor Martin asking permission to sell liquor in the Howell district, was refused by the court.

The court granted a petition for the appointment of A. W. Long and M. H. Gehlar as deputy county clerk.

The petition of H. Overton, et al., for the installation of a telephone in the lobby at the county court house, was continued, to be taken under advisement, until the next meeting of the court.

Petitions asking permission to open the ballot boxes at Gervais and Chemawa in order to learn election returns was granted by the court.

The transference of \$2,605.21 from the general road fund to the general fund was ordered by the court.

County School Supt. Smith will be in the country during the greater part of this week visiting schools.

Marriage license was granted by County Clerk Allen today to A. M. Collins, age 43, of Toledo, Ore., and Beth L. Comer, age 32, of Stayton, Ore.

Deputy Sheriff Esch recognized and arrested H. E. Nebold Saturday who is wanted in Ritzville, Wn., on the charge of seduction and placed him in the county jail pending the arrival of the Washington officials. A wire was received this morning by Sheriff Minto from Sheriff E. D. Gillen saying that Deputy A. J. Coas would arrive soon and take charge of the prisoner. Mr. Coas is sheriff-elect of Adams county, and is

a former Salem resident. He held offices in this city for several years, being at one time chief of the fire department and at various times special policeman. He has many friends here who will be glad to hear of his good success in Washington and of his visit to Salem.

President Gompers was asked to make a statement this morning in answer to that made by President-elect Taft, that, while he was on the bench, he had laid the foundation for prosperous and effective labor unions as they are controlled today.

"I do not care to enter into any extended discussion of the recent campaign, for the reason that I have sent out my opinions in my annual report," said Gompers, "and it would be wrong to forestall that. I can say, however, that Mr. Taft's statement is false on its face.

"We have lost the fight this year for justice to the working people of America," continued Gompers, "but that does not signify that we shall give up the fight. Quite the reverse is true. We shall continue the fight and while the American people have by their vote endorsed the stand of the Republican party on these questions in which labor is vitally interested, yet I am sure that today, organized labor was never more solidly together.

"The organization has solidified labor; it has brought organized labor together firmly and compactly and we are determined to keep the fight for justice."
