The score was 6 to 0 in the first of the second half Eugene slightly rallied but had a chance for a touchdown before mentioned but Salem took the ball out of danger and kept Eugene fighting to defend their goal the rest of the game. Salem worked a great number of fake bucks, kicks and forward passes which were too much for the visitors. Salem's defensive work should be especially mentioned as they completely stopped nearly every play that Eugene attempted. For Salem every man was in the game was a star, but of these John Parsons at halfback was the particular one. He was the talk of the day and was probably the best man Salem high

has ever had. As both a ground gainer and defensive man he had Eugene entirely baffled. He was good for his yardage any time he took the ball and his tackling was a feature of the game. Kay was another star and spectacular player in Saturday's game, making a number of long runs. Just as time was called he carried the ball half the length of the field to within a yard of the line and if Salem could have had time for one more play it would have meant another touch-down. Hunt at fullback played a hard and smashing game and Richardson put up his hardest game of the season. Too much cannot be said of the back field as they worked together perfectly. Cliff Farmer did great work as quarterback. It was his cool generalship and headwork and placing of plays that made every down count. Krebs at end handled Eugene's famous 238-pound tackle in a way that made his presence hardly felt in the game. The whole Salem line was like a wall, E. C. Lagworth as tackle played strong and Eyre at center put up a remarkable defensive game. Barrick at guard played a fine game for a new man. The game was one to be long remembered in Salem. This will give Salem high school a good chance at the state championship if a game can be arranged with the winners of the Portland league, which game, if won by Salem, will give them the Western state championship as Eugene has already won over all of the strongest southern Oregon teams. Saturday's victory will give the Western Oregon Athletic league pennant to Salem high school. The credit of Saturday's victory can be given directly to Chauncey Bishop, whose excellent coaching and training is what put the Salem team in shape to outplay the strong Eugene team. **Reception at the High.**

The great event of the evening was when Capt. Richardson was called to the platform to receive the Capital Journal silver trophy cup presented to the winning team. The applause made the roof vibrate and Richardson could hardly get command of his language, but finally made a clever speech of acceptance, saying he hoped that Salem would not be treated as badly when they went to visit Eugene next year.
