### SERVIA THREATENED

#### WITH REVOLUTION

Vienna, Nov. 11.—Reports from Belgrade today say that Serbia is on the verge of civil war, as the result of the insistent demands that King Peter abdicate the throne in favor of Prince George. This would be a direct step toward the punishment of the present regime for what the people consider serious errors in the present crisis.

The army of Serbia is divided in sentiment between the two factions and there is immediate danger of most serious developments. Russia is trying to act as the peacemaker but is advocating that King Peter abdicate, offering him refuge, an income and compensation for loss of the throne.

### AMUNDSEN TO FLOAT TO POLE IN ICE PACK

Christiana, Nov. 11.—Captain Roald Amundsen is making preparations today for another lecture tour to obtain funds for the starting of his voyage in search of the north pole.

He finished his lectures here last night with a talk before the king and other distinguished men at the Royal Geographical society and he outlined his plans for starting the polar expedition for the first time.

Captain Amundsen will start from San Francisco early in 1910 on the Fram which will be equipped for a seven-years' voyage. He plans to fasten his ship in the ice northwest of Point Barrow, the most northerly point in Alaska. He hopes to drift from there to the north pole.

### OFFER SKIN TO SAVE LIFE OF ENGINEER

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Rafael, Cal., Nov. 11.—Ten men called at the Cottage hospital here today and offered to have parts of their skin removed to be grafted on the body of Philip Redmond, a

railroad engineer, who was scalded in a wreck at Novato last July. The ten fellow workers who came to his aid today make a total of 150 who have given skin to the injured engineer. It is believed that he will recover and that his cure will be one of the most remarkable in the history of skin grafting.

### KIDNAPER OF ENGLISH CAUGHT

(United Press Leased Wire.) Seattle, Wash., Nov. 11.—Leo Bezemer, who is accused of attempting to kidnap Edward English, the wealthy logger of Whatcom county, and hold him for \$5000 ransom, was captured in a logging camp near Snohomish, according to a report just received here by the local police.

Further information cannot be obtained because the posse is supposed to be in a dense forest not far from Marysville. It is thought that if the report of the capture is true, Bezemer was located by Sheriff-elect Stevenson and a posse that started out early today. Stevenson had information that Bezemer was hiding in a log cabin and that food was being brought to him by friends.

### BEAT AND THREATENED TO KILL HIS WIFE

Spokane, Nov. 11.—That her husband has repeatedly threatened to blow her brains out, choked her, compelled her to sleep on the bare floor without any covering, and, on another occasion, kicked her bodily out of doors, comprised part of the testimony given in the police court today by Mrs. Mary C. Larson, wife of Andrew Larson, who was a brother of the late Peter Larson, said to have been the wealthiest man in the northwest.

He was on trial charged with threatening to kill his wife and also with assault and battery. At the conclusion of the hearing he was put under a \$2000 bond to keep the peace for a year.

### AMERICAN OFFICERS TO CONDUCT CUBAN ELECTION

Havana, Nov. 11.—American army officers are leaving today for their posts in the six provinces from which they will act as supervisors of the rural guards as a further precaution against trouble in the national election of November 14. The army officers were ordered to their stations by Governor Charles E. Magoon recently.

Reports from many of the towns in the island today indicate that serious trouble may be expected on election day. Governor Magoon would like to preserve order without calling on the American troops now stationed here. If, however, the situation becomes alarming, he will order out the soldiers.

Major Herbert J. Stocum, who organized the rural guard of the island, will be in charge on election day and General Rodriguez of the Cuban army will remain in Havana to assist him.

### ROOSEVELT SAID TO BE ENEMY OF PEACE

Philadelphia, Nov. 11.—That President Roosevelt, winner of the Nobel peace prize, should be considered an enemy of peace is astonishing the members of the Friends of Peace association today.

Professor William Isaac Hull of Swathmore college is responsible for the statement and the members of the local branch of the organization are hinting today at what they term an attack upon their idols.

"Theodore Roosevelt is the most dangerous enemy to the cause of international peace to be found in this country," declared Professor Hull in an address before a select audience of the association last night. He followed this up with the statement that Captain Richmond Pearson Hobson and Rear-Admiral Robley D. Evans, who are the foremost advocates of the expansion of the country's fighting strength are greatly thwarting the efforts that are being made to develop modern ideas of peace.

### Italian King's Birthday.

Rome, Nov. 11.—All Italy is celebrating today the occasion of the 39th birthday of King Victor Emmanuel III, the third king of United Italy. Public festivals are in progress in this city, Florence, Naples and Vienna and His majesty has been the recipient of congratulatory messages from all the reigning monarchs of Europe.

Handsome gifts were taken to the Quirina today to the king from the royal families of Europe.

Victor Emmanuel was the only son of Humbert I and succeeded to the throne on the assassination of his father, July 29, 1903.
