WAR CAUSES DROP IN SUGAR PRICES

(United Press Leased Wire.)
New York, Nov. 11.—Bitter war being waged today between the American Sugar Refining company and Arbuckle Bros., who are apparently being assisted in their fight by the Federal Refining company. Sugar prices are being slashed and the open sharp competition has resulted in scaling down the margin between raw and refined products to a basis, it is said, that little more than meets the cost of production. The cause of the breach between the two leading producers can only be surmised, but it is current gossip in the trade that Arbuckle Bros. have had a falling out with the new administration of American Sugar Refining company. It is said that an agreement reached some years ago between the late president Haverly and the Arbuckle Bros. has terminated, and that the latter declined to renew it.

RESTRAIN POWERS OF EMPEROR

FACTIONS UNITE TO LIMIT KAISER

Berlin, Nov. 11.—The reichstag was packed today when the debate on "the indiscretions of the kaiser" was continued. Every available seat in the galleries was taken and there was no standing room. Herr Schrader, for the national liberal, Herr Hoffman, for the united liberals, Herr Gamp for the conservatives, Herr Norman, for the imperialist conservatives, and Herr Zimmermann for the Agrarians led today's attack on the emperor which was as bitter as yesterday's debate.

These leaders, all representing opposing factions in the German parliament, joined on the issue before the reichstag and all demanded a limitation of the kaiser's personal power.

The speakers demanded a pledge that the kaiser refrain from giving interviews in the future without first submitting his remarks to the ministers of the foreign offices.

"The dignity of the nation, to say nothing of its safety, demands that we check the royal prerogative of sowing broadcast opinions that don't in the least reflect real German sentiment," declared Norman at the close of his speech.

The other speakers took the same attitude. They resented everything said, the statement of the emperor that the large fleet of Germany was aimed against England.

It is thought today that a bill will be introduced limiting personal power of the emperor and that Chancellor von Buelow will resign in consequence.

CONFEDERACY'S DAUGHTERS HOLD CONVENTION

Atlanta, Nov. 11.—The fairest women of the South are here today to attend the annual convention of the United Daughters of the Confederacy, which opened a three-days' session this morning.

Mrs. Cornelia Branch Stone, president of the general division opened the convention. The morning session was given over to the organization of the convention and the appointing of the various committees and this afternoon is to be taken up with social events.

A most elaborate series of entertainments has been planned for the guests. Governor and Mrs. Hoke Smith are to give a reception to the delegates tonight.

The Atlanta federation of clubs is to hold a special meeting at the Piedmont Driving club house and a number of other exacting entertainments of other attractions are planned. The Robert E. Lee and Jefferson Davis chapters of the organization from San Francisco are represented, as are many other western chapters.

five coaches and a baggage car. All the coaches of the Northeastern train were derailed and badly smashed. The wreckage caught fire but was soon extinguished.

SIX DEAD IN WYOMING WRECK

Denver, Nov. 11.—Reports from Borie, near Cheyenne, Wyo., today say that six persons were killed and three severely injured in a freight wreck near that place today.

The wreck was caused by an extra freight train crashing into the caboose of another freight train.

Engineer Schley, Conductor Murphy and Fireman Christensen are among the dead. Three bodies still are in the wreckage and there is a possibility that still another person was killed.

The collision occurred at a point on the Union Pacific 11 miles west of here. The caboose caught fire from the engine.

Denver, Colo., Nov. 11.—Later advices from Borie, Wyo., today say that nine men were killed in the Union Pacific wreck near there, when two freight trains met in a rear-end collision. The dead:

Engineer Schley, Conductor Murphy, Fireman Christensen, Brakeman Duncan (Stitt and Rodgers and three Japanese workmen.

Three were probably fatally hurt.

Francisco that Japan could mobilize an army that might sweep the country.

"Mind you this only a theory in answer to a theoretical question, but you must remember that you have no Port Arthur in this country."

The significant statements were made by the Japanese lawyer at the conclusion of an interview in which he disclosed the plan of the Japanese to invite one hundred representative American newspaper men to visit Japan to study conditions.

Dr. Niyakawa said that the plan has already been formulated and that the emperor has signified his approval.

In describing the proposition Dr. Niyakawa said:

"We of Japan regard America as ruled by the press. Your papers give the people news and mould their opinions. Count Okuma, President Osano and President Uken, of the two leading steamship lines of Japan think, as do many of our prominent men, that if the newspapers only knew conditions in Japan they would see just how the two country's interests are cohesive. Then there would be little chance of 'jingo' war news creeping into the columns of the papers."

"Those men who edit are those who should know the conditions. Now they do not."

"When our emperor sent a personal message to the President, one of peace, the people of Japan—the majority of whom held the emperor as the descendant of God who could not make a mistake—said: 'Great is America. We must have peace.'"

"They echoed the mikado's thought. It is religion there to regard the mikado as God. His message has insured peace."
