

COURT HOUSE NEWS PERSONAL MENTIONS

A complaint was filed in the circuit court this morning by Ralph E. Cartwright for the purpose of asking the court to prohibit the defendants in the suit, A. P. Gaines, Mary E. Gaines, Catharine T. Green, Homer Green and Ada O'kane and W. S. O'kane, from claiming an interest in 140.60 acres of land which the complaint alleges is the sole property of the plaintiff, and that the defendants are in no manner entitled to interest in same. The complaint also asks the court to award costs and disbursements in addition to the above mentioned decree prayed for.

An appeal was filed in the circuit court this morning by attorneys for the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company from an action and decision of the board of equalization denying and disallowing a petition presented by the company at the last meeting of the board for reduction on assessment of their property in Marion county. The present amount at which the company's property is assessed, is \$150,000. The petition and appeal asks that the assessment be reduced to \$48,051, or a cut of \$1949. From all indications the telephone company intended to push this matter to the end, and some little excitement is predicted at the next term of court.

Thieving in Willamette—
Yesterday morning about 5 o'clock it is believed, sneak thieves operated in the Hotel Willamette and carried off two overcoats, three dress shirts, two suit cases and a .38-caliber revolver, all the articles being the property of hotel guests. The hotel management have not the slightest knowledge as to the thief and they regret the unfortunate occurrence. How the robbers succeeded in getting possession of the articles and leaving the hotel without being noticed is a mystery which the police are endeavoring to figure out.

NO CLEW TO MISSING GIRL OF SAN FRANCISCO

Alameda, Cal., Nov. 11.—The failure of every clew to lead to the whereabouts of Edna Clark, the missing art student today has caused her mother Mrs. Anita Mack almost to give up all hope of ever seeing the girl alive. Fearing that her daughter has been the victim of accident or foul play, Mrs. Mack ruefully admits the fear that she holds little chance of her daughter's return.

The fear is shared by many of those who know the missing girl and who believe that she would do everything in her power to tell her family that they need not worry about her.

From the studios of the large cities where a girl of Miss Clark's inclinations would go, and from the hospitals where she might be lying ill and unidentified, the police inquiry has been extended to a search of the morgues. Descriptions of Edna Clark, and pictures, and the clothing she wore on the day of her disappearance are posted in the corner's office of every large city.

The official probing of alleged scandal in the church of St. Mary the Virgin in San Francisco will begin late today, when the bishops' court of inquiry will investigate the charges that the Rev. Payson Young hugged and kissed Edna Clark in

the seclusion of his study, and that the rector similarly consoled old women of his congregation.

The accused rector probably will appear in his own behalf, and women who are members of his congregation will be called. Edna Reynolds, the girl chum of Edna Clark, is expected to repeat her assertions that Edna Clark told her that she was engaged to Father Young and that he "wished a ring on her finger."

FAITHFUL DOG IS KILLED BY HIGHWAYMAN
(United Press Leased Wire.)
Portland, Or., Nov. 11.—In a futile effort to save his master from being robbed by a masked highwayman after midnight this morning, a big St. Bernard dog owned by F. W. Lutkemeier, a saloonkeeper, was shot and killed by the bandit.

As the masked robber entered Lutkemeier's saloon the dog, who was waiting for a word from his master, sprang at the intruder's throat. One bullet from the robber's revolver killed the faithful animal. The desperado then lined the proprietor and the four patrons in the place at the time and robbed them and the cash register.
