TEAMSHIP WAR BRINGS LOW RATES

San Francisco, Nov. 12.—In order to meet the cut in rates on flour from Pacific coast ports to the Orient, that has been made by the Canadian Pacific, Great Northern and Nippon Yusen Kaisha Steamship companies in the north, the Pacific Mail today made effective a reduction in the rate on flour to Hong Kong from \$4 to \$3 a ton.

This same reduced rate will hold good on all the Pacific Mail lines from the coast to Hong Kong, and it is thought that the Portland and Seattle line will get more trade under the new schedule than the other lines will get.

The reason for the reduced rate on flour is given as a war on tramp steamers that carry cargoes from the coast to the Orient and which have been cutting into the trans-Pacific trade by reducing rates.

The Pacific Mail officials say that their line is the largest cargo carrier from here to the Orient and that Hong Kong is the principal Oriental port effected by the competition of tramp steamers so rates on cargoes to other ports have not been reduced.

CLEVELAND LINES ARE OPERATED BY RECEIVER

(United Press Leased Wire.) Cleveland, O., Nov. 13.—The traction lines of Cleveland, which have been the basis of a long legal struggle that has attracted the attention of the entire country, are to be operated under the direction of Judge Robert W. Taylor, of the United States court for the northern district of Ohio, as the result of action in his court today when receivers were appointed. Judge Taylor named F. A. Scott and Warren A. Bickel as the receivers of the Municipal Traction company and the Cleveland Railway company, pursuant to the petition of the Central Trust company of New York, as trustees for the bond holders.

Each receiver must furnish a bond of \$100,000 and then they will take over the management of the lines under the immediate direction of the court.

They are instructed to give the "lowest possible rate of fare, consistent with good service." What this rate will be, depends upon the decision of Judge Taylor, as he will have the final decision on every question of policy and manipulation regarding the operation of the lines.

WOMAN REAL ESTATE DEALER IN PRISON

San Francisco, Nov. 12.—Miss Ida E. Miller, a well known realty dealer of this city, is in the city prison today awaiting the outcome of a charge of forgery that has been placed against her by Miss Frances Chatten, a wealthy woman, who accused Miss Miller of having forged her name as endorsement to several notes.

Miss Miller is said to have admitted that she wrote Miss Chatten's name to the notes in question but that she had Miss Chatten's permission to do so. Miss Chatten denies this.

ADD MISSING

San Francisco Cal., Nov. 12.—Rev. David J. Evans, secretary of the ecclesiastical court of inquiry that is examining into the charges that have been made against Rev. Payson Young, rector of the Church of St. Mary, the Virgin, in connection with the disappearance of Edna Clark, announced this morning that there would be no more sessions of the court of inquiry until after affidavits have been filed with the court.

"No more hearsay or gossip will be considered before this board at all," declared Rev. Evans. "We will investigate carefully every charge that is made against Rev. Young but these charges must be sworn to. Until we receive affidavits, we shall take no action."

Father Payson Young, accused of knowing where the missing Edna Clark of San Francisco is, writes from his place of hiding asking for an investigation.

CRIMINALS TO GAIN BY MARRIAGE

FREED ON ABRUZZI'S WEDDING DAY

(United Press Leased Wire.) Rome, Nov. 12.—To promote the happiness of the people at the time the Elkins-D'Abruzzi nuptials are celebrated, imperial clemency will be extended all petty and political offenders, according to reports current here today.

The Duke D'Abruzzi has been in conference with his cousin King Victor Emmanuel, according to the court gossip, and it is intimated that amnesty to prisoners will be given at the time of the marriage of Katherine Elkins to the duke.

The Italian monarch celebrated his birthday anniversary yesterday but the proposed promotion of the duke to the rank of rear-admiral in the navy which was announced for the king's birthday, was not made. It is said Abruzzi requested that the matter be indefinitely postponed.

Preparations are quietly going on for the wedding. It is hinted, however, that the duke still is soliciting the consent of Queen Margherita to the match, although her refusal would not prevent the nuptials, it is said.

WHEEL SUCCESSFUL BETTORS DOWN STREET

San Francisco, Nov. 12.—Joseph Lyons and L. Noonan, two of San Francisco's big business men are explaining to their friends today that they have not gone crazy and that they were in their right minds last night when they trundled Joseph Lawrence and William Goldman, two equally prominent business men down Market street last night, proceeded by a brass band playing "Hail to the Chief."

The parade of last night was only the belated paying of an election bet Lyons and Noonan had bet on Bryan and the other two fancied Taft.

The wheelbarrow parade began at Eighth and Folsom streets, three blocks south of the city hall. The men wheeled the victors over to Market street and down Market street to Third, amid the cheering of a large crowd. Traffic was almost blocked during the parade.

POSTAL DEFICIT IS LARGEST IN HISTORY

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, D. C., Nov. 12.—Postmaster General George Von L. Meyer today announced that the postal deficit of the last fiscal year was \$16,910,278.99, the greatest in the history of the country. He suggested that, as a means of preventing a deficit a special total parcels post be inaugurated over rural free delivery routes. Postmaster General Meyer declared that the establishment of this parcels post would wipe out the deficit ultimately by making rural free delivery routes self-supporting. The postal receipts for the last fiscal year were \$191,478,662.41 and the expenditures were \$208,388,941.42. The receipts for the fiscal year 1908 exceeded those of the fiscal year 1907 by \$7,893,657.84.

The postal receipts for October, 1908, showed a general increase over the receipts for the same month last year. The statements of the receipts from the five largest postoffices show that New York received \$1,794,797.69 during this month, a 6 per cent increase over the receipts for the same month last year. San Francisco is high on the list with \$192,698.06, an increase of nearly 6 per cent over October, 1907.

SAYS SHE IS VICTIM OF SPITE

(United Press Leased Wire.) Chicago, Nov. 12.—Mrs. Martha Dunphy, wife of Dr. Dunphy of Boston, arrived here today from that city to face charges preferred against her by Charles E. Giles, a money lender of Boston, that she had stolen several thousand dollars worth of securities and jewelry from him while they were staying at a local hotel. Giles declares that he went to a room-one day to find his trunk broken, the securities and jewelry gone and Mrs. Dunphy missing.

Mrs. Dunphy emphatically denied that she was guilty, in an interview to the press after her arrival today. She declared that she had borrowed the money from Giles nine months ago, offering stock in the Hallow Medical Institute of Boston and some jewelry as collateral.

She declares that she paid \$25 a week until the account was almost paid and that Giles tried to make love to her during this time.

She finally became tired of his attempt at love-making, she says, and wrote to her sister at Missoula, Mont., asking for a loan of \$275 to settle the entire account.

Her sister agreed to let her have the money, she says, and she met Giles at Butte where he said he would return her collateral to her as soon as the \$275 was paid.

They went to Missoula together, she says, and the money was paid in the presence of her sister, and the collateral returned to her.

She denies that she ever broke into Giles' trunk and ascribes his charges to revenge because his attentions were not received by her. Mrs. Dunphy is a niece of Frederick P. Plagemann, proprietor of the Golden West hotel in San Francisco.
