belabored hound beneath his master's lash." Not being the owner of a newspaper, I ask you for a little space to defend myself from the charges and abuse of this great paper. Believing in the doctrine that abuse is not always argument, I shall not take up your valuable space by calling the editor of the Oregonian vile names.

I concede that the Oregonian has for 35 years been the leading Republican paper in Oregon. I concede that the Oregonian worked hard, and did more to cause the enactment of the direct primary law than all the other forces in Oregon combined. I concede that the Republican party passed the primary law, and that it was largely through the influence of the Oregonian that 16,000 people voted for the primary law and election of U. S. senators by the popular vote, whereas only 16,000 voted against it.

Backward on time in your fight a few years to the hall of the state senate, and we find the electric light shining brightly on the men who formulated and voted for that law, for the election of United States senators by the popular vote, all prominent in the councils of the Republican party. Here they are:

Turn back again for the time, for twenty years, and come on down the line, and we find every Republican state convention passing resolutions in favor of election of United States senators by popular vote and the legislators of the state of Oregon following suit. All these resolutions and promises and laws are violated even before the people have had an opportunity to try them out or to enforce them.

Backward again, a little more than a decade, and we find that some of the now Republican leaders were then wandering away from the Republican fold and following after false gods, and voting for the unlimited coinage of free silver at the ratio of 16 to 1 and advocating these thoughts through the columns of the Oregonian.

If the able editor of the Oregonian has become convinced that he was wrong when he advocated the primary law and the election of United States senators by the popular vote, would it not be better for him to come out and acknowledge the error of his way and right the wrong by good, clean argument, and not by calling Statement No. 1 Republicans fools and cowards and violators of their oaths and the constitution? But it is Mr. Scott's policy to rule or ruin, and he is attempting to rule all the Republicans out of the party who are advocating the very doctrine that he formerly preached. If Mr. Scott was right when he advocated the election of senators by the popular vote, he is wrong now.

When the Republicans pledged themselves to vote for the late Senator J. N. Dolph for re-election, and violated their sacred pledge the Oregonian for many moons abused them and read them out of the Republican party. If you were right then, Mr. Scott, you are wrong now when you ask Republican members of the legislature to violate their pledge to the whole people; and if you were right, Mr. Scott, when you abused Republicans for violating their pledge to Senator Dolph, you were wrong when you telegraphed to Senator Brownell on the last day of the session of 1903, to vote for H. W. Scott for U. S. senator and violate the pledge he had made to Senator Fulton.

The Oregonian is much worried about Statement No. 1 Republicans violating their oaths and the constitution of the United States, and has written many editorials warning them of the great crime they are about to commit. Now let us see what the constitution of the United States says about the election of senators. Section 3 of article I reads: "The senate of the United States shall be composed of two senators from each state, chosen by the legislature thereof." Now I do not know of any Statement No. 1 man

who is contemplating, or wants to, or will violate this section of the constitution; on the other hand, they expect to vote to a man to represent Oregon in the United States senate as provided for in said section 2 article I, unless through the efforts of the Oregonian and others who want to be U. S. senators there is a holdup and they are prevented from so doing. Such things have happened in the past.

Again, the Oregonian has published column after column saying that Statement No. 1 Republicans are about to violate their oaths as members of the legislature. Here is the oath that each member is required to take: "I do solemnly swear or affirm as the case may be, that I will support the constitution of the United States and the constitution of the state of Oregon, and I will faithfully discharge the duties of representative or senator, as the case may be."

Now, in all candor, I will ask Mr. Scott what oath or constitution has to do with the election of a U. S. senator any more than it requires the members of the legislature to elect a senator; and the constitution further provides, that the man elected shall be a citizen of the United States and the state of Oregon, and of a certain age. It does not say that a man must be a certain brand of Republican or Democrat.

The Republican party passed the primary law. All the Republican leaders of Oregon advocated it. Mr. Scott wrote some of the most able editorials that were ever published in favor of this law that he is now condemning. Lincoln has said that "The best way to repeal a bad law is to enforce it." I have confidence in the people and in the Republican party that if they find the primary law is not a good law they will, by their votes, repeal it.

The editor of the Oregonian has written many good, able articles in the past 20 years showing up the corruption and evils of the senatorial election at Salem. He has written many able articles about the use of money and the buying of votes and the holdups in the Oregon legislature, and has been so unkind as to say that money was used at the holdup session and in the session of 1903 to elect U. S. senator, and has published affidavits that two of the leaders of the Republican party in Oregon actually gave a member of the legislature the sum of \$1500 for his vote. There is no prospect of a Statement No. 1 man ever getting \$1500, or any other sum, for his vote unless he violates his pledge made to the people.

It is to be hoped that wisdom will not die with the Oregonian, and that some modern Moses will come forth and gather together the scattered hosts of the Republican party that Mr. Scott has kicked out, and that before another election rolls around they will have united, and that the Republican candidate who has been nominated at the primaries will be elected at the following election.
