**MAY KNOW SOMETHING OF THEFTS**

A chimney sweep, giving his name as Jack Bradley, is now confined in the city jail awaiting a hearing before Judge Moore on the charge of carrying concealed weapons, and some suspicion is also had toward implicating him with the Willamette hotel robbery owing to the fact the revolver he had upon his person belonged to a victim of the theft. In addition to this suspicious circumstance, Bradley was found to have false whiskers on his person.

Yesterday afternoon Chief Gibson was called to the Japanese restaurant on Court street to settle some difficulty between the proprietors and two strangers who were destitute of raising trouble, and he ordered the two men out of the eating house. When the intruders had departed the restaurant people then informed the chief that one of the men had drawn a gun on him, and made several boasting threats, whereupon Gibson started in search of the pair and instructed his force to keep a lookout for them and the result was, one of them was rounded up last night by the officers and lodged in jail. Upon searching the man a 38-calibre revolver was found on his person, which afterward proved to be the one stolen from Kola Nels, the well-known hop man, who is a guest at the Willamette hotel. Nothing more suspicious was discovered about the man until this morning, when it was discovered he wore false whiskers, and that according to information received by the police, he was seen going to the depot in company with another man, and was assisting him in carrying three suit cases. After questioning the prisoner, he told the authorities that the other party, not giving his name, who had gone to Eugene, sold him the revolver. Instructions were wired to the Eugene authorities this morning by Chief Gibson to arrest any man seen in the vicinity of that city following the description of the unknown.

**FIGHT TO LET HUSBAND GET HER MONEY**

New York, Nov. 12.—Edith Kip McCreery, who was divorced from Richard McCreery of San Francisco, and who subsequently married Lord Coventry in London, is preparing today to secure the annulment of a trust deed placing her property beyond the control of her

husband, in order, it is rumored, to avoid trouble with her spouse. The deed was executed before the marriage of Mrs. McCreery to Lord Coventry. The document which conveyed \$2,000,000 in trust to a cotier of New Yorkers, contained the stipulation that the property should be free from the control of any one she might marry. After her marriage, it is said that

Lord Coventry declined to sign the endorsement on the back of the deed approving the stipulation. Preliminary action for the annulment of the deed was taken yesterday when, with permission of Justice Truax she served Lord Coventry her son, James N. Gerard, Andrew L. Norrest and Ernest Iselin, the trustees, as co-defendants, with notice of the suit for annulment.
