- Sherman has joined Taft and other political conferees, to discuss the issues, at Hot Springs, Va.

HACKENSCHMIDT AND GOTCH TO MEET IN MATCH
London, Nov. 13.—Frank Gotch and George Hackenschmidt, the two champion wrestlers shook hands and buried their grievances today. They began negotiations for a match that will probably be pulled off early in March here. Gotch invited Hackenschmidt to his apartments in his hotel and Hackenschmidt accepted the invitation. Each greeted the other in a friendly fashion. Committees will be appointed soon to select the referee and make other arrangements for the match.
