because they fear that it may fatally for the dowager empress who is seriously ill.

San Francisco, Nov. 13.—Prominent Chinese in the local colony, informed by the United Press of the death of Emperor Tsai, popularly known as Kwang, began arrangements to fittingly observe the sovereign's death.

According to the editor of the Sat Yat Bo, the successor of the emperor will be Pu Yi, a nephew of the empress dowager, who is in fact ruler of the Flowering Kingdom. He is merely an infant and the empress will retain control of China. The death of Kwang is looked upon by the Chinese as involving no change in the dynasty of China and the progressive will be compelled to await the death of the empress before witnessing the full awakening of the nation. The emperor whose death is announced today, was 36 years of age, but actually ruled his country only a few years. The empress was completely overshadowed by her successor, Pu Yi, and the dynasty continues in power.

### PACIFIC COAST BEGINS TO USE CENT PIECES

San Francisco, Nov. 13.—Dues for copper cents and nickel pieces, together with the other metal for making coins, are on their way from the mint to this city today, and stamps that have been almost exclusively devoted to turning out eagles and double eagles will soon be stamping the meaneast coins stamped by Uncle Sam.

Until now, the Philadelphia mint had a monopoly for copper cents and five-cent pieces. The demand for the small coins on the Pacific coast and in the Rocky mountain region has led Director Leach of the mint to start their coinage here.

Last year San Francisco used 23,000,000 cent pieces and so far this year has ordered 600,000 more. The supply of nickels on the Pacific coast has been getting low and these will be coined also.

The coinage of the small money will be begun in ten days.

### BOYS COMMIT BOLD HOLD-UP

Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 13.—Rudolph Dehtalov, 14 years of age is under arrest today charged with being one of a pair of boys who felled I. Josephs with a club in an attempt to rob his grocery store. Detectives are seeking the companion of the alleged robber.

The boys' plan of robbery was cunningly devised. One of them entered Josephs' store and asked for some kerosene. When the proprietor went into the oil room to fill the order the other youthful thug was lying in wait and felled the grocer with a club.

Josephs was not rendered unconscious by the blow and his cries for help frightened away his assailants before they had time to rob the store.

found lying under the debris on the cellar floor. He said they were badly burned and that there was a hole in the forehead of one of the children. He described the mutilated condition of the remains and identified bones removed from the bodies.

Lamphere is suffering greatly under the strain of the trial by which he is visibly affected. He was very nervous when the case was called to day and he listened to the testimony of Dr. Mack with an intensity of expression that indicated suppressed excitement.

## SHEEPMEN CONDEMN PINCHOT

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Boise, Ida., Nov. 13.—Alarmed at the increasing restrictions being imposed by the forestry bureau, the Idaho woolgrowers' association adopted resolutions condemning the policy of the government.

Governor Gooding, one of the biggest sheepmen in Idaho and heretofore known as an advocate of the government's forest policy, declared at the meeting of the association, which was held last night, that, although the association is in hearty accord with the policy of conservation of national resources, it believes that the great range should be utilized to its fullest extent. Many of the prominent sheepmen who have heretofore been friendly to forester Pinchot declare they have now become thoroughly alarmed over the policy he is pursuing.

## TAKING DEW BATHS NOT INSANITY

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Boston, Mass., Nov. 13.—The denial of the application of Mrs. Mabel Dutton for the guardianship of Mrs. Shaw, who was alleged to be a follower of Mazdazans, a cult of sunworshippers today leaves Mrs. Shaw free to manage her large estate, take dew baths on her Lowell lawn in diaphanous costume and give her money to the Mazdazans.

Judge McIntyre of the probate court ruled yesterday afternoon that the indulgence in dew baths is not a sign of insanity and does not preclude the bathers from possession of ability to manage her finances.

Even though Mrs. Shaw should desire to enrich the sunworshippers with her worldly goods there is no evidence of insanity according to the court. The expressed belief of Mrs. Shaw that the wearing of clothing was a crime and a sin, is accounted rational in the opinion of Judge McIntyre. The Mazdazans took upon the decision as a victory of the faith.

## TO BECOME BANKRUPT'S PARTNERS

Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 13.—Creditors of Fred Deor, the bankrupt broker, are today preparing to become his partners in the hope of recovering the amounts due them.

Realizing that the loss of his seats in New York and Chicago stock exchanges, will rob him of all chance to retrieve his shattered fortune, Deor has proposed to his creditors that they accept 20 to 25 per cent cash on all claims, dismiss the bankruptcy proceedings against him, and then, forming a holding company to which will be paid one-half of his net earnings when he resumes business.

As Deor's liabilities are \$485,793.69 and his assets much less, the scheme is looked upon favorably by most of the men whom the broker owes money.

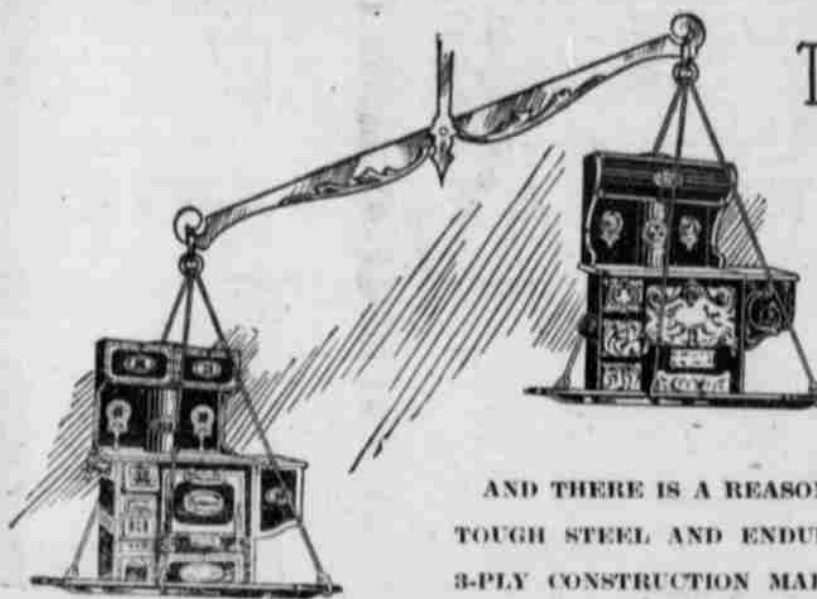
