## PORTLAND LEADERS BANQUET

### DUNIWAY STAYS BY PRINCIPLE

Portland, Nov. 15.—(Special.)—The Taft banquet pulled off here by the county Republican central committee was not well attended. Of the 350 places not over 125 were occupied at the love feast, and with M. C. George in the chair, the most prominent speakers, Geo. H. Williams, Henry E. McGinn, Judge Northrup, Harvey Scott, Prof. Robinson and "Hon. A. G. Rushlight" whoever that is, were conspicuous by their absence. Senator Fulton made the principal speech, which was a plea for a return to the convention system of making nominations, and for the election of some one else than Chamberlain to the United States senate. The senator made the best of a difficult position, and the machine politicians present made nearly all the noise. The surprise of the evening came when the second speaker, Hon. Willis Duniway, warned the Republicans to go slow in tampering with the direct primary law or putting the part in the attitude of breaking pledges or opposing the election of senators by the direct vote of the people. Duniway farther made things chitzy by repeating several times that it was the duty of Republicans after conventions and primaries had been held to support the nominees. Fulton's refusal to take the stamp for Cate was not mentioned by name but it might as well have been.

## PRESENTED CHRISTIAN SCIENCE

### TO LARGE CROWD OF HEARERS

The Christian Science lecture Sunday afternoon at the Grand opera house by Bliss Knapp of Boston, drew a large and intelligent audience. Many Scientists were present from Albany, Corvallis, Silverton, Dallas, Independence and Portland. The lecturer was introduced by ex-Mayor Frank W. Waters, who compared the present confession and divergence of religious views with the times of the tower of Babel. Christian Science had come to bring peace and order into human affairs. How this was brought about would be set forth by Bliss Knapp, a member of the Christian Science board of lecturership.

**Report of the Lecture.**  
 Mr. Knapp spoke of the vast following which this system of religious thinking and healing had secured in the 40 years since its discovery and promulgation by Mary Baker G. Eddy. He claimed that this truth meant life and healing for humanity. He claimed that this was the distinguishing feature of all Christianity. What had made Christian Science practiced and demonstrable? What constituted the "works" of Christ but his healings and reformations. More space was devoted to healing in the Bible than to any one subject. What was this power which Jesus employed? He had heard that divine power described in California as hypnotism. But his healings were mental, a spiritual consciousness of power. What was God but Divine Mind? It was everywhere available and open to use by everybody—this divine principle. He traced the development of this idea through Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Moses, until they demonstrated its absolute truthfulness and reliability on all occasions. Next came the revelation by Jesus of Nazareth of the Immanuel. Jesus points John to his works of healing and reformation.

The teaching that God is love still further unfolded the divine mystery and established the fulfillment of the law. How could one fear infinite love? The old teaching of a jealous and angry God was foreign to Christ's teachings. Divine love was the benign power that healed and saved. Christian Science presented this divine law in all its unity and order and system. This demonstrable divine law was Immanuel or God, with us. It was the only sign of truth made manifest to this age. Jesus taught this spiritual understanding to his disciples by "opening their understanding." Scientific right reason was the only line of progress by which to unfold the individual into higher spiritual selfhood. Jesus began with easily understood parables, then with advancing illustrations until he destroyed evil and healed the sick with their higher understanding of spiritual consciousness. Finally they understood spiritual things in spiritual terms. Hypnotism was absolutely the opposite of Christian Science.

We showed how the mind affected respiration, circulation, digestion and all the functions of the organs constituting life as understood even from a material standpoint. Was the individual governed by the carnal or the spiritual mind? The carnal mind means disease and death. The spiritual mind produces harmony and health in the individual, demonstrate happiness and freedom. The lecturer had the most profound attention of a very intelligent audience.

# FORAKER'S EXPIRING STATEMENT

## MAN DITCHED BY HEARST

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
 Cincinnati, O., Nov. 16.—The final statement of Senator J. B. Foraker preliminary to his fight for the senatorial toga will be forwarded today to the members of the legislature who will vote for or against him. Foraker specifies, however, that the statement is not intended to convey the impression that he will devote no more of his attention to the campaign, but that he does not intend to engage in an unseemly scramble. The statement consisted of a letter from Virgil P. Gline of Cleveland purporting to show the exact nature of Foraker's employment by the Standard Oil company. Foraker declared that the statement should "satisfy any fair minded man." In closing, Foraker said: "Whatever may be the result, I shall always be profoundly grateful for the many distinguished honors I have enjoyed at the hands of the people of Ohio, and shall always have the satisfaction of knowing, whether anybody else does or not that I have under all circumstances striven to serve my state and my country faithfully and efficiently and, whether right or wrong, never more so than in regard to those questions in connection with which I have been criticized."


