## CHINESE AFFAIRS

be awaiting them but it is anticipated by the envoys that the journey will not be impeded.

During their stay at Honolulu the envoys landed and paid official respects to Governor Preer and the Chinese consul. Upon visiting the consulate the travellers learned of the death of the emperor but not of the dowager empress.

The rumor that Secretary Chung of the ambassador's staff is to succeed Minister Wu at Washington was not confirmed by the diplomats.

**Empress Tse Hsi An Dead.** Sunday's telegrams say: Tse Hsi An, the dowager empress of China, autocratic head of the government, which she had directed without successful interference since 1861, and without protest since 1881 died at 2 o'clock this afternoon.

The announcement of the dowager empress' death was official and followed closely upon the announcement that Kwang Hsu, the emperor, had died yesterday at 5 o'clock in the afternoon, but it is believed the deaths occurred a considerable time before that set down in the official statement.

An edict issued at 8 o'clock placed upon the throne Prince Pu Yi, the 3-year-old son of Prince Chun, the regent of the empire, in accordance with a promise given by the dowager empress soon after the marriage of Prince Chun in 1903. An edict issued Friday made Prince Pu Yi heir presumptive.

It was announced that the legation guard was ordered out at "the special call of the legations, on account of the emperor's death." Prince Chun, the regent, has ordered the viceroys and governors to take precautions for the continuation of the administration of the provinces as heretofore, and he has ordered a hundred days of mourning. The court will go into mourning for three years.

**Both Die Alone.** At the palace elaborate rites are being observed. A flood of edicts has been sent forth.

Deathbed observances of 3000 years ago marked the passing of the emperor and dowager. They died alone and unattended, although surrounded by circles of abject sycophants who remained a rod distance, as on account of the sacred persons of their majesties they could not be approached.

The emperor died as he had lived, without administration of whatever kind or scientific aid. For months he had refused to permit the services of foreign physicians, and although it was stated that he had gone back to the old form of medical treatment, it is believed that latterly he received no treatment at all.

**Chinese Royalty Poisoned.** Tokio, Nov. 16.—It was learned here today from a high official source at Peking that the dowager empress of China died suddenly last Saturday morning at 2:30 o'clock and that the

death of the emperor occurred after death of the empress. The announcement was made by an official of the imperial government who stated that the dowager empress, Tse Hsi An, had died Saturday morning and that the emperor had died Saturday evening at 6 o'clock.

It is strongly suspected here that both the Chinese rulers were murdered either directly or by slow poison. It is known that the emperor and the dowager empress had not been friendly for years because of the progressive tendencies of the emperor. It is thought here that both rulers died as he result of an elaborate web of intrigue that has been woven with Chinese patience in the celestial court for many years.

An imperial edict issued today proclaimed Prince Chun, the brother of the dead emperor, regent of China and Pu Yi, his son, the emperor. The Japanese press is unanimous in hoping for peace in China.

Prince Chun is a modernist, is well acquainted with the foreign residents of the empire and promises to coincide with modern ideas and civilization.

... bassador Tang Shao Yi, will soon arrive here on the Pacific Mail steamship Mongenela and will await advices here in San Francisco before proceeding to Washington.

San Francisco, Nov. 16.—Prince Tsai Fu, nephew of the late Emperor Kwang Hsu, next in seniority for elevation to the imperial throne, lost his opportunity to rule the Chinese nation, by accepting the post of envoy to America in the commission of thanks for the remission of the Boxer indemnity by the United States.

Whether Prince Tsai was a victim of circumstances or the plot of high enemies who anticipated the emperor's death and determined the succession to suit themselves has not as yet been established. It is believed by leading Chinese here today that Prince Tsai was the victim of a court clique that surrounded the dowager empress and was forced to accept the post that would take him from China at a time when the death of the emperor was daily expected.

It is believed here by Chinese in touch with home affairs that Prince Tsai was deliberately shovled to permit the ascension of Pu Yu the present 3-year-old emperor. At the time the death of the empress was not expected and it is believed that the empress and her ministerial reign planned to the situation.

The calculations were overturned by the death of the dowager. Pu Yi, in the absence of Prince Tsai, ascended the throne but the strong hand of his father Prince Chun as regent, took control of national affairs and the awakening of China is predicted.

The new regent is strongly supported by the Bow Wong Woei and its branches which form the modernist parties and they are exultantly predicting the rapid advance of China and the dismissal of the corrupt ministers who surrounded the dowager.
