## BUSY BUILDING WINTER AHEAD FOR BUSY SALEM

The Spaulding Lumber Co. is clearing ground on the corner of Front and Perry streets for a large shingle mill. Brownstein & Son have plans completed for a reinforced concrete building 145 by 45, with plate glass garage on Front street. The Central grocery will be abided by the same firm store on Front street and will be occupied by Oregon Shoe Co. The Oregon Shoe Co store will be added and added to the floor of the Chicago store as soon as can be vacated. Welch Bros. have secured the construction of the new Eugene postoffice building to cost about \$55,000. Eaton hall at Willamette University has the stone foundation nearly completed and work will be pushed to completion by January. H. S. Jory of South Commercial street has bought the property on east side of Commercial street from the Jory factory, and will build three cottages. Catlin & Linn have made arrangements to build a large two-story brick on Front street between State and Perry. Architects report a number of other business buildings under plan and the winter here will be as busy as the summer.

## LITTLE JOHNNY JONES

Without exaggeration, the "Little Johnny Jones" production Saturday night, was the grandest melodramatic production ever gracing the stage, the actors being superb in the costumes and scenery element. Every one of the 450 spectators who were fortunate in seeing play, were highly pleased, and only sorry when the last call the curtain came, for of a surety jollier, snappier, or more attractive play has visited the Capital City a good many years. The play is composed of three acts and four scenes, the first act showing Hotel Cecil in London, at which "Little Johnny Jones" first makes his appearance as a reputedly big game American who rides and a big derby in England owing several underhanded turns being played by a one Anthony Anstey, American gambler. The second act shows the steaming pier at Southampton, England, the docking of the steamship

"St. Hurrah." This scene took the audience by storm. It showed "Little Johnny Jones" leaving England after his ill luck on the race course, and after the ship had left the pier in plain sight before the house, a scene with a darkening effect showing the smoke and hundreds of lights of an enormous ocean liner steaming at full speed in mid-ocean followed which was greatly appreciated by the audience. Mr. Charley Brown, who played the part of Little Johnny Jones, proved to be a prize winner. His entire performance was replete with the newest and snappiest musical hits combined with the finished manner in which he carried his regular part of the performance. Mr. Brown's song hit entitled, "Life's a Funny Proposition After All," was the favorite piece of music during the evening. M. Wm. Keough, who played the part of "The Unknown," made a host of friends in Salem. His acting could not impersonate the regular dyed-in-the-wool all round race course followed more perfect, and every time the big fellows appeared before the audience he received generous applause. Chinatown, in San Francisco, being the last scene, was also put on in an excellent manner. The scenic effects were almost perfect combined with the natural oriental inhabitants who were made up and carried their parts admirably. Sing Son, the Chinese newspaper man, by Wm. Forrest, Timothy D. McGee, the New York politician and horse owner, by Danny Simmons; Jenkins, the starter at the Cecil, by Jack Harrington and Mrs. Andrew Kenworth, a fanatic on subjects of reforms, by Miss Leo Mordant, were all actors seen once are to be remembered for the precise handling of their respective parts. The chorus was also well selected and trained to perfection. Notwithstanding the many reports of the local theater being on the downward course, the show last Saturday night should have some effect upon the amusement loving people of Salem, and it would be well to consider, that the "Little Johnny Jones Co." does not make it a practice of playing in cities under the 20,000 mark, but upon several urgent requests they were induced to visit here.
