SENTIMENT AWFUL AGAINST GRAFTERS

(United Press Leased Wire.) Oakland, Cal., Nov. 16.—A committee of ministers of the Oakland church federation today sent to Mrs. Francis J. Heney a copy of a resolution of condolence adopted at yesterday's mass meeting of the Oakland churches. It reads:

"Dear Mrs. Heney:—Gracious God bless and restore speedily to full health your husband and thus bless our state, is the prayer of the church federation which met in the crowded First Methodist church of Oakland. We extend to you our fullest sympathy in this acute suffering.

"By order of unanimous vote." The church was crowded at the meeting yesterday. After addresses by nearly every minister in the city, the following resolutions were adopted: "We demand such an enforcement of laws shall compel respect for soundness of life and limb. Whereas, the district attorney, the sheriff, the judges, and all the public officers of the court represent us, the people, we demand that their lives and their attempts to enforce the law be consistently protected.

"Whereas, the lives of our wives and our children are endangered by the criminal element which caused the attack on the home of one of our judges and the home of a witness for the state in the graft prosecution, we demand a speedy and just trial of those now accused of those dastardly acts, so that if these be not the criminals we resume the search for the guilty ones and so that our wives and children may cease to fear.

"Whereas, every lawyer is sworn to be a friend of the law that he may become an officer of the law, we demand that those whose habit to prevent or subvert justice, over throw the law and resort to any device that criminals may go free, should forthwith be disbanded.

Whereas, acts of the benefit renders the principal as well as the agent liable, we demand that imprisonment of trustees or directors directors as principals and that the immediate actor as agent be made alternative penalty when a corporation is the beneficiary of unlawful or criminal act or acts.

Whereas, an over emphasis on the rights of the accused to an impartial trial has led to a wilder case of technicalities and trivialities that cumber the records, confuse juries, delay cases and defeat justice, we demand that the rules of procedure be revised so as to prevent these abuses and until then that such sharp, clear, prompt and precise use of summary process be made that we, the people, may have the blessings of speedy and just trials, as well as the speedy and impartial trial.

Whereas, sentiment booth of public are press are responsible for kid glove handling of criminals, we demand that the soft speech which tenders aid renders aid and comfort to the enemies of our wives and lives be excluded from public utterance and that business men be warned against advertising in the vilifying journals and fellow citizens from subscribing for this and from reading the foul and vice breeding papers.

San Francisco, Nov. 15.—Nearly every church in San Francisco was given over yesterday to the denunciation of the attempt to kill Francis J. Heney. Every minister in the city preached on the subject of municipal uprightness and denounced the men supposed to be responsible for the attempt on Heney's life.

The most crowded meeting was in the First Presbyterian church where John W. Sweeney, one of the labor leaders of the city, flayed the "higher ups" in an address. He declared that the indicted men hired Thomas B. Dozier, an associate counsel for Ruef for the express purpose of nagging at Heney until he would say something that would lead someone to think that he was justified in killing the prosecutor.

Sweeney declared that Police Commissioner Kell was the man who gave the order that Burns should not be allowed to see Haas in jail and denounced Kell as a "grafter."

SPECIAL AGENT BURNS CONFESSES HE WAS BEAT

San Francisco, Nov. 16.—Special Agent William B. Burns today stated that he would ask the police commission to investigate the suicide of Morris Haas, the would-be-assassin of Heney, who killed himself at the county jail Saturday night. He is anxious to learn whence came an alleged order that he was not to be permitted to see the prisoner and wants to know how Haas could secure a gun under the very eyes of three policemen detailed to watch him to prevent that very thing.

The investigations carried on by Burns have proved one thing to his satisfaction. He says the gun was not carried into the jail by Haas. Someone gave it to him after he was confined in the cell, he says.

Burns, thinks, this was his wife, knowing he fact that Mrs. Haas denies that she carried the pistol to her husband.

Chief of Police Biggy, on the other hand says that Haas carried the pistol to the cell with him and states that Police Captain Duke did not search the prisoner carefully. Captain Duke takes issue with Chief Biggy and says that a careful search of the prisoner was made before he was put in jail.

The outcome of the dispute will be charges against Chief of Police Biggy himself, who is to be called on the carpet and is to be asked to explain why he has given out statements declaring that the shooting of Heney was not the result of conspiracy and why he gave the order that Burns was not to see the prisoner, Haas, if he gave such an order.

"From what I have learned, I am satisfied that Mrs. Haas, either willingly or unwillingly, passed the Derringer to her husband," said Burns today. "In view of this fact and the fact that he killed himself while un-

der guard of men detailed to watch him, every moment, and after I had been denied admittance by these same men, and had later secured from him a confession directly contradictory to their reports, the case assumes a bad phase which demands a thorough investigation. I will prepare formal charges against Kelly and Attridge, Haas' guards and in this way we will find out who was responsible for the order that I should not see the prisoner, why it was anticipated that I might visit him and why, if it was anticipated, the district attorney's office was not notified that such an order had been given.

"It is all very strange. The police believe Langdon to be out of town for he had communicated with them from Fresno and yet the order was given that he might see the prisoner but that I, his representative might not. Had I gone out there at once, I would have had not time to make another trip during the afternoon. I would have not been able to talk to Haas and his confession, which has already been of great value to us, would have died with him.

"We obtained that confession after the policemen had reported that the man was crazy and that he was alone in the commission of the crime. That might have ended the case had the wishes of the police department been carried out."
