BALKAN TROUBLES RENEWED

EUROPE STRIVING AGAINST WAR

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Vienna, Nov. 19.—The news that Montenegro is manning the passes between her territory and Herzegovina and that Australia is mobilizing the Fifteenth army corps on the Servian frontier, started afresh today the rumors that real war is to be declared on the Balkan peninsula and there is considerable apprehension in diplomatic circles here lest a war involving the whole of Europe will be started before the holiday season.
The Austrian note to Russia has not cleared the atmosphere and it is the attitude of the dual monarchy that is really responsible for the failure of the proposed Balkan conference and the imminent possibility of war.
The peninsula before this has been petty campaigns galore, but somehow the powers have always managed to stave off a free-for-all fight that today seems probable.
It is agreed at all the European chancelleries that even a settlement, should one be reached, can hardly last long.
These rulers and their countries are involved in the controversy:
Emperor Franz Josef, of Austria-Hungary; Kaiser Wilhelm, of Germany; Czar Nicholas, of Russia; Sultan Abdul Hamid, of Turkey; Czar Ferdinand, of Bulgaria; Prince Nicholas, of Montenegro; King Charles, of Roumania; King Peter, of Servia; King Edward, of England; President Fallieres, of France; King Victor, of Italy.
Bulgaria started the row, Ferdinand was a vassal of the Sultan. He wanted to be independent. Afterwards he wanted to head a Balkan federation. His army is better though smaller than Abdul Hamid's. A successful campaign against the latter would give him the prestige he needs among the Balkan states. European statesmen are not sure whether he seized the Bulgarian division of Turkey's Oriental railway because, as he charges it discriminated against Bulgarian commerce, or simply to pick a quarrel. He stepped it anyway, and he won't give it up.
King Ueter of Servia also want a Balkan federation but he prefers to head it himself.
