New Steamer on Coast.

Seattle, Wash., Nov. 19.—It is announced here today that the steamer Admiral Sampson, one of the largest and fastest vessels of the United Fruit Company of the Atlantic will be brought around the horn and be put on the run between Seattle and San Francisco early next year. The vessel has been purchased by President H. F. Alexander of the Alaska-Pacific Steamship Company, who is now in New York and who has wired that he has made arrangements for the sending of the new vessel to the Pacific ocean.

MONTENEGRIAN THREATENS AUSTRIAN SEAPORT

Vienna, Nov. 19.—Reports of continued aggressions on the part of the Montenegrins on the Austrian border reached here today from Cetinje and Antivari. The advices from the Capital declare that the Montenegrins are cutting telegraph wires and fortifying the heights overlooking the Austrian seaport of Cattaro. It is rumored that 8000 men have occupied the mountain passes leading from Montenegro into Herzegovina.

The government here has notified Russia that the Fifteenth army corps is being mobilized on the Serbian frontier as a measure of defense.

Austria's action in the proposed conference on the Balkan situation is as yet a matter of doubt. It is intimated however that the Austrian government will not accede to the idea of a conference on subjects at present embodied in the proposal, but that her note to the interested powers' suggested new phases of the question for discussion.
