FATALLY WOUNDS OFFICER; THEN HANGS HIMSELF

(United Press Leased Wire.)
San Jose, Cal., Nov. 21—After a fight with a desperate thug in which he was shot twice, Patrolman Ray W. Starbird is lying in a precarious condition today at the city hospital. George Ballard, ex-convict and morphine fiend, who did the shooting when Starbird called to arrest him at his home last night, hung himself in his cell at the city jail 20 minutes after his capture.
Mrs. Ballard, the wife of the dead man, is being treated for a shot wound in the right arm, received when she attempted to wrest a revolver from the hands of her husband during the fight with Starbird.

Starbird was ordered by Chief of Police Haley yesterday afternoon to arrest Ballard on suspicion that the convict was implicated in numerous bicycle thefts. Taking with him Patrolman John Sallsbury, Starbird went to Ballard's home.
Sallsbury remained in the patrol wagon while Starbird entered the house. A scuffle was heard and two shots followed. When Sallsbury broke in the door, he found Starbird desperately wounded but clinging to Ballard. In a huddle nearby lay Ballard's wife.
Starbird was hurried to the hospital where it was ascertained that

two bullets penetrated his abdomen and he has little chance of recovery. Mrs. Ballard refused to go to a hospital and a surgeon later extracted a bullet from her arm.
After being taken to his cell, Ballard attempted to butt his brain out against the wall. Half an hour later, a trusty saw him hanging from a window bar in the cell. Ballard had made a noose of his suspenders and was dead when cut down.

Gompers re-election comes as a vindication of his course in taking the American Federation of Labor into politics and working for the election of William J. Bryan during the last national campaign.
Although the convention has been in session for two weeks and several efforts were made to organize an opposition to Gompers, they all failed and the president of the organization was swept into office again with a great demonstration.
James Duncan was re-elected first vice-president by acclamation.
Daniel Keefe, one of the vice-presidents of the federation, was forced to decline re-nomination by

the recommendation of the committee on Gompers' report, which stated that all who do not agree with the political policy of the executive council of the American Federation of Labor should resign from office.
Keefe was given permission to make a personal explanation of his reasons for declining to accept the nomination. He said that the adoption of the report of the committee on the president's report compelled him to leave the executive council as a matter of principle.
"I have voted the Republican ticket for 32 years and will continue in that faith until my conscience tells me to do otherwise," declared Keefe, in explanation of his action in sup-

porting Taft in opposition to the recommendation of the executive council. He was liberally applauded when he took his seat.
ACCIDENTALLY KILLED BY 9-YEAR-OLD BOY
Santa Ana, Cal., Nov. 21—Clay McDowell, aged 14, died today from a gunshot wound received in the hands of 9-year-old Augustus Jones last night.
The boys were duck hunting and Jones' hammerless shotgun was accidentally discharged. The charge entered McDowell's abdomen.
