VED IN OREGON 48 YEARS

CHEMAWA DEFEATS O. A. C. 2ND

The Chemawa Indian school this morning defeated the second team of the Oregon Agricultural college with a score of 5 to 0 in a hard fought game. The Indian school enthusiasts, as a result are this afternoon singing it as their belief that they have a team which will stand a good chance of defeating Multnomah, O. A. C., or the University of Oregon teams. O. A. C. had slightly the best of it during the first half, keeping the ball well down in the Chemawa field, but the half ended with the ball at O. A. C.'s 25-yard line. The second half was almost entirely fought in the O. A. C. field and the Indians won their victory when "Big Sam" Dillstrom, right tackle, made a run through the left guard tackle and carried the ball over O. A. C.'s 25-yard line with two men clinging to him. The O. A. C. coach says Chemawa has the best trained team he has seen on the coast.

NO TREATY MADE WITH JAPANESE

C., that the American state department and the Japanese ministers are concluding an agreement relative to the attitude that America will take on the Manchurian question are unfounded and ridiculous, is the statement made today by Thomas J. O'Brien, American ambassador to Japan in an interview with a representative of the United Press. Ambassador O'Brien stated that it must be admitted that Japan has an influence in Manchuria that entitles this nation to a special claim. The conventions already in force between Japan and Russia and Japan and France, he said, assure peace in the Orient and make the signing of an agreement with America unnecessary.

INTERVIEW WITH KAISER CORRECT

London, Nov. 21.—A story printed here today to the effect that the story of Dr. Bayard Hale's interview with Kaiser Wilhelm on board the imperial yacht Hohenzollern told yesterday, is correct has added to the sensation created in diplomatic circles by the alleged outburst of the German emperor. The story says that Dr. Hale visited the Kaiser with the intention of writing an article on his daily life and that the famous interview came as an unexpected surprise. It is stated that Dr. Hale went from Bergen to Brussels where he stayed at the Hotel Bellevue and there made as accurate notes as it was possible for him to make with the Kaiser's words still in his mind. The story says that the Kaiser's interview with Dr. Hale had been edited by the German foreign office and would have been perfectly harmless had not the Kaiser given a representative of the London Telegraph an interview that create a world wide sensation. The story printed here says that the notes made by Dr. Hale on his interview are in the possession of the Hearst bureau here.

ESPEE FINED FOR NEGLECTING CATTLE

San Francisco, Nov. 21.—The Southern Pacific company today faces a fine of \$5000 following its conviction before Federal Judge Van Fleet yesterday on ten charges of violating the law providing that cattle shall be watered and rested at prescribed intervals during their transmission by railroads. The government brought suits on charges of twenty-two alleged violations of the law but withdrew two of them because they failed to make out cases. WITNESS AGAINST TREADWELL IS DEAD

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Nov. 21.—Preparations are being completed today for the funeral of Brodie M. Bradford, the former confidential agent of Jas. Treadwell awaiting trial on charges outgrowing the failure of the California Safe Deposit & Trust Company. Bradford was one of the most important witnesses during the grand jury into the wreck of the institution. It was expected that he would be an important witness against Treadwell when the banker comes to trial on one of the several indictments pending against him. Bradford died yesterday after a month's illness. Funeral services will be held tonight and the interment will take place at San Jose. Bradford was a native of New Brunswick and was 48 years old.

THREE KILLED IN COLLISION

(United Press Leased Wire.) Toledo, O., Nov. 21.—Three men were killed and one badly injured in a collision between freight trains on the Ann Arbor railroad near Lakeland, Mich. The collision is said to have been caused by a mistake in signals. One of the freight trains, it is believed, ran past a signal following a chance in orders. Both trains were badly piled up. The dead taken from the debris are: Andrew Oregan, fireman, Toledo, Ohio; William Ryan, engineer, Owosso, Mich.; fireman, name unknown. The injured: M. Draper, engineer.

MILLION BET ON YALE-HARVARD GAME

(United Press Leased Wire.) New Haven, Conn., Nov. 21.—All betting records have been beaten in the wagering of money on the outcome of the Yale-Harvard football game this afternoon. It is estimated that before the game is called, over a million dollars will have been placed. In one place alone \$20,000 has been staked on the game on each side, making a total of \$120,000. It is stated that over \$300,000 will change hands in this city alone. Most of the money has been put at even terms. Yale men have not given odds while Harvard men have given as high as 8 to 5.

BILL TO DO AWAY WITH CURB BROKERS

San Francisco, Nov. 21.—Copies of a bill designed to keep "fakers" and "sharks" out of the real estate business which will be presented at the session of the next state legislature, are being sent to all responsible real estate dealers throughout California by the State Realty Federation. The bill was prepared by De Witt H. Gray of Fresno, chairman of the legislative committee and former president of the Realty Federation. The desired law, if passed, will make it a misdemeanor for anyone to engage as a real estate agent without obtaining a license from the state and without filing a bond for not less than \$5000 for the benefit of persons with whom the agent may deal. The measure is aimed to check the work of brokerage firms that spring up when sales and investments become brisk. It will also protect the real estate fraternity from unjust censure when a "curb" firm is exposed.

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
