scene of the robbery at once, but could get no clew to the thieves.

MAYOR FAILS TO GET EXTRA OFFICER

When approached on the vital subject—at present—of appointing an extra police officer for the city authorized by the city council at the last meeting, Mayor Rodgers said he had not as yet made any definite arrangements toward that end, although he had in sight several good men from which to choose. He gave no direct reason why he had not made the appointment before now, nor was there any special candidate mentioned.

Notwithstanding that the appointment of another policeman would not entirely eliminate all the evils now going on, another good officer would go far in preventing the outrages. The general sentiment of the people is in favor of enforcing the present protective body of four men to eight, and also securing the services of some experienced detective who is familiar with the criminal element.

Some more must be made by the Mayor in the direction leading to the protection of the city from the unlawful element, which infests Salem in alarming numbers, as reports are daily coming in from all suburbs near the city of outrages committed. The situation has grown so serious that residents have a constant fear especially at night of the prowlers, and the nightly occurrences in this line only tend to further agitate those who have not as yet been visited by robbers and sneak thieves. A well-known citizen, an authority on crime, commenting on the situation today, said no city in the United States which has improved and grown so rapidly as Salem, and which shows prosperity advertised throughout the nation, can expect to be exempt from the thieving class. The robber is a man bent upon gaining money with the least possible effort. They are seldom visitors to cities of insignificance, or to places where money is scarce; they keep posted on the most likely spots where money is abundant, and the information discovered by one is in turn passed along the line. The gentleman who gave this information does not wish to have his signature attached to any article which may be written, but any one wishing to learn how these statements came to knowledge, can get all the information desired by visiting the Seattle or Portland police headquarters and ascertain the fact for themselves.

At the meeting of the City Council tonight, the police subject will be again taken up, and probably something will transpire which will be beneficial in procuring the much needed assistance in Salem, and Mayor Rodgers will have a chance to explain why he has not secured, as he is ex-officio chief of police, an extra officer as authorized.
