JOHNSON IS HIT BY LINEMAN

Elwood Logan, who was arrested Saturday night for assaulting Walter Johnson and two young boys on Commercial street, is now confined in the county jail on the charge of assault and battery on the boys only. Logan continued to make himself objectionable all evening Saturday and the police were watching him when he made a vicious swing at two lads standing on the corner of Ferry and Commercial streets, who had not given him any provocation whatever. Logan, had he succeeded in striking one of the boys with the heavy pair of pliers which he used as a weapon, would, at least, seriously injured him. Walter Johnson induced Logan to desist from making a fool of himself and took him into a nearby saloon to prevent further trouble on the street, when the unappreciative fellow struck Johnson over the head with the pliers. He was then taken to the jail.

It has been rumored that Logan is connected in some manner with the party or parties who was associated with the hold-up man, Black, but Logan is a lineman by trade, and has been in the city only a short time.
