SEATTLE TAKES HONORS IN HARD FOUGHT GAME WITH THE LOCAL LADS

One of the fastest and hardest fought games of football ever being pulled off on the Willamette field, was played yesterday afternoon by the Salem High School and the Seattle High School teams.

It appeared at the start that the Salem lads were going to put the down-and-out mark on the visitors by the way they hammered into the defense fast and furious.

In the last half, the Seattle team leadout to pile up some points, which they did. Their first advance on the score book, was obtained through a forward pass executed within a few feet of the goal and resulted in a touchdown.
