EXPOSES GABRERA'S CRUELTY

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Nov. 27.—An appeal to civilization for the suppression of the atrocities charged against Manuel Cabrera, the Guatemalan premier by Dr. Fornas Diaz, former Honduran secretary of state is made public today by a friend of Diaz.

The translation of the appeal for which issued in La Republica of San Jose Costa Rica, begins: "I make a general appeal to all honest men in the world, to those who love justice, hate crime and feel in their hearts commiseration for our Guatemalan brethren—to all these I appeal today in order that the tyranny which now prevails on Guatemalan soil may be abolished in the name of humanity and civilization."

After referring to the wholesale assassinations alleged to have been ordered by Cabrera, Dr. Diaz recites the case of John Binelli, an Italian subject, who was poisoned by the jealous Cabrera, according to Diaz. Diaz charges that Cabrera became jealous of Binelli because of a woman's love for the Italian. He ordered Binelli confined in a Guatemalan dungeon on a ship and then slowly poisoned him to death.

Dr. Diaz declares that his charges are the outgrowth of personal knowledge of the facts in the particular case. He was confined for several months as a political prisoner in a cell next to that in which Binelli was at first placed. There he came to know and admire the Italian and learned the latter's story.

FIGHT PROVED A BAD INVESTMENT

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Nov. 27.—Fight promoter James Coffroth has discovered today that he was loser by his middleweight battle at the Mission arena. He had counted on a \$30,000 house, but the gate receipts when totaled amounted to \$18,321, a little over half of what had been expected.

Of this amount, Papke, although loser, gets the larger share, he having demanded \$12,000 of the first \$20,000. It is probable, however, that they will make a split of the money on a basis of 60 and 40 per cent. Ketchel taking the short end of the money.

Presently a policeman stepped from a passing car and nabbed the foot-pad. It developed that it was Horn's finger that the brothers mistook for a pistol.

WANTS TO BUY BACK ZION CITY

BALKAN WAR CLOUD CONTINUES TO DARKEN

(United Press Leased Wire.) London, Nov. 27.—War in the Balkan provinces is near according to those familiar with conditions in the Near East and the newspapers today are commenting on the situation.

The failure of negotiations between Russia and Austria is regarded as a certain indication of a conflict and it is believed that Russia sees in Austria's stand, a determination on the part of Austro-Hungarians to attack the Slavs.

Turkey, Servia and Montenegro are believed, in diplomatic circles, to have closed a defensive pact. How far Russia is interested in the move is not known, but there have been persistent rumors that the great Slav nation has promised the confederated Balkan states every support possible short of acts that might involve the czar's domain in war with the empire of Franz Josef.

The Viennese Bourse, the pulse of Eastern Europe, is showing the signs of war by the dropping of stock values. Many of the prices are below the level reached during the panic that followed the announcement of serious illness of the emperor Franz Josef.

Four newspapers have been suppressed and their plants confiscated for printing news of the movements of Austrian troops. The stock exchange has been notified by the government that there is no serious trouble; that upon the outbreak of hostilities the Bourse will be notified. This assurance, however, has failed to restore confidence and the prices are falling steadily.

MILLION FOR U. S. CARDINALS

(United Press Leased Wire.) Rome, Nov. 27.—A lottery of American millionaires has offered a contribution of \$1,000,000 in "peter-pence" to the church, if two American cardinals are created at the coming consistory.

MYSTERIOUS SHOT KILLS BLACKSMITH

(United Press Leased Wire.) Eureka, Cal., Nov. 27.—D tails of the mysterious shooting of Bert Porter, a blacksmith of McKinleyville, was received here by telephone early today. The circumstances surrounding the killing of Porter will lead to a rigid investigation by the county officials.

Porter was duck hunting in a lagoon a mile from his home. A party comprising William Pardon, Walter Liscom, Mr. and Mrs. William Rogers of Arcata who were rowing nearby, saw him sitting on the bank with a hot gun in his hand. There was a report of a gun and they saw Porter topple over.

When they reached him he was dead but his own weapon had not been discharged.

A small bullet hole was discovered on the right side of his head. The ball had passed through the brain and emerged at the forehead. Duck hunters searched the woods in all directions but no one carrying a rifle was found.
