GIRL IS CAUSE OF TRAGEDY

Berkeley, Cal., Nov. 28.—Jealousy over Dolores Rodriguez, a pretty Cuban girl who kept house for one faction in a colony of quarry workers at East Bay, just north of Berkeley, is said to have caused the fatal shooting yesterday, when Jose Taboda received a charge of buckshot in the abdomen and lay in the roadway for hours before medical aid was summoned.

Taboda is now at the Alta Bates sanitarium in this city, and it is not expected that he will recover from his wounds. Bernardo Norbiger, one of Taboda's comrades, is also in bed suffering from a gunshot wound in the knee. Ten Cubans, who participated in the fight, are in jail at San Pablo. Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 28.—Homeless, hungry and unable to secure work, Evelyn Kahl, a pretty girl 22 years of age, is in jail here today accused of larceny after admitting that she stole a small piece of garden hose to save herself from starving to death.

Officers are investigating the girl's story today and if it is substantiated she will be released. C. Baxter, from whom the hose was stolen informed the police that he did not wish to prosecute the case.

"I have been sleeping on porches and in alleys for three weeks," the girl told the officers today, "and I have actually begged food. Each day I walked the streets seeking work of any kind."

"Thanksgiving day was the worst. I hadn't a bite to eat and was suffering from the cold." That night I stole the hose and sold it to a junk dealer for enough money to pay for a meal."

FLEET AT MERCY OF FOREIGNERS BECAUSE OF BAD COAL FACILITIES

Washington, D. C., Nov. 28.—The possibility of the great Atlantic battleship fleet, strong and powerful afloat, lying weak and helpless because of lack of coal, was shown today in the report of Admiral William S. Cowles, chief of the bureau of equipment, to the navy department.

According to the report, the cruise of the fleet shows the need of more colliers. Had there been foreign complications or a combination of for-

eign shipowners the fleet might have remained helpless at some foreign port.

The problems of supplying coal are great and the navy colliers are known to be unequal. The bureau, unable to obtain American ships at a reasonable price, has found it necessary to charter foreign vessels.

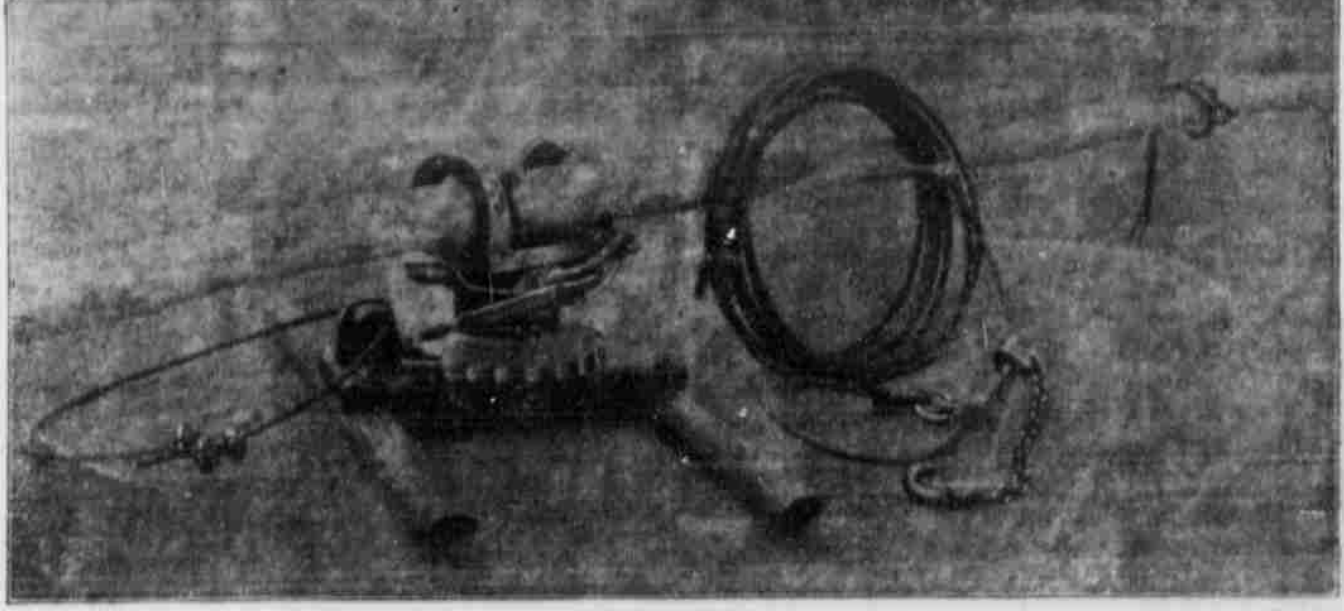
The report says that development stations under the bureau will be established at Washington and ultimately on the Pacific coast, Hawaii, Guam, Samoa and the Philippines.
