STABBING AFFRAY OVER SOCIALISM

San Francisco, Dec. 1.—Stabbed, following a quarrel over Socialism, Z. Otsuka, editor of the Japanese Daily News, is at the Central Emergency Hospital in a precarious condition, while his assailant, F. Takenuchi, editor of the New Labor, also seriously gashed, is being held by the police. The attack occurred at Otsuka's home, 1615 Laguna street, where Takenuchi called to obtain satisfaction for the editorial roast which he had received last week. Otsuka was in bed, and Takenuchi went away only to return shortly afterwards, demanding admittance. This being denied, he broke down the door and rushed into Otsuka's room. Here the two men clinched, and, in the struggle, both received dangerous wounds. The noise of the fight attracted the attention of a policeman, who placed both combatants under arrest.

GOVERNMENT DOES NOT OBEY ITS LAW

Tacoma, Wash., Dec. 1.—State Railroad Inspector Perley announced today that, as a result of his investigation into conditions at the Puget Sound navy yard, he was satisfied that the United States government was violating in a flagrant manner the safety appliance laws, under which it has in the last few years collected thousands of dollars in fines from the railroads. Perley says that he cannot interfere because the alleged defective cars are being operated on government property.

The flat cars at the navy yard, he says, have neither power brakes nor hand brakes, and the only way to control them is to rely on the locomotive brakes. This is contrary to the federal law, which demands that all trains shall be equipped with either power brakes, to enable the engineer to control the speed of the train without it being necessary to set the hand brakes. The cars also lack impact couplers, which are also required under the laws.

VENDETTA IS AT WORK IN CAMP

Oroville, Cal., Dec. 1.—The officers of Butte and Plumas counties are today seeking a lone Italian who killed one and wounded another of his countrymen in a camp of laborers just beyond the Plumas county line. The fugitive is believed to be making his way in this direction, and the deputies are keeping a sharp lookout for him. The affray yesterday was a continuation of a bloody vendetta, which has already cost the lives of two Italians. Adolph Giulio, who killed two Italians at a Western Pacific camp some time ago, is now under a life sentence for his crime. The victims of yesterday's tragedy are believed to have been witnesses of that former deed, whose lives were demanded as a forfeit by Giulio's friends.

TOWN CANNOT LICENSE GAMBLING

San Rafael, Cal., Dec. 1.—The gamblers and race track followers in Sausalito today are preparing to stop their operations there, following the decision of Judge George W. Bushy yesterday which swept away the technicalities behind which they were taking refuge.

Suit was begun more than a year ago by District Attorney Thomas F. Boyd to have two houses operated by Frank Daroux declared nuisances. After various technicalities had been interposed defendants offered a special defense that the pool rooms were licensed by the town trustees of Sausalito, and therefore could not be considered illegal. The gamblers also claimed that the question had been formerly adjudicated.

Judge Bushy declared that neither of the technicalities were sufficient answers to the complaint. He therefore overruled the demurrer, and the case will proceed to trial on its merits.

UNCLE SAM SAYS PRICE TOO HIGH

Washington, D. C., Dec. 1.—Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Winthrop intimated today that the prices asked for the four sites in San Francisco, suggested as the best locations for the new sub-treasury, were too steep, higher than business conditions in that city warranted, and more money than the federal government proposed to pay. The choice of one of these four sites may be swayed by the alacrity with which the owners of the property take the hint and reduce their figures. The new sub-treasury will be a four-story structure of classic design, constructed of stone and concrete.
