Proposals Invited.

Proposals invited for supplies for Oregon State Penitentiary for period ending June 30, 1909. Bids for drugs, dry goods, groceries, butter, leather and oils, hardware, flour and meat. Bids received at the office of the Superintendent of the State Penitentiary until Monday, December 21, 1908, at 10 o'clock, p. m., at which time will be publicly opened.

Deposit of \$200 in cash or certificate, made payable to the Superintendent must accompany each bid for meat and flour, and all other bids must be accompanied by an amount equal to 10 per cent of the amount of the bid. Bids must accompany all bids insofar as practicable. The right is reserved to reject any and all bids and to accept or reject any portion of the bids. On each envelope should be printed the word "Proposals." Bids of Oregon manufacture or production will receive preference, all things being equal. Goods and supplies must be delivered to the penitentiary within 20 days after the contract is awarded.

Schedules of the various lines of railroads to be bid on will be furnished on application to the Superintendent.

Teachers will be issued for payment the first of the month following the completion of contract on a monthly on continuous contract.

PAYSON YOUNG MUST ACCOUNT

(United Press Leased Wire.)
San Francisco, Dec. 3.—A chaotic condition of affairs in the finances of the church of St. Mary, the Virgin, of which Father Payson Young was rector, has resulted today in a determination on the part of the trustees to ask for funds held by Father Young.

The discovery of discrepancies followed the withdrawal of Father Young from the church, after his name was connected with the disappearance of Edna Young, the Alameda art student. The rector resigned the pastorate and was succeeded by the Rev. Father Dodd, of Wisconsin. Father Dodd, however, refused to take over the funds from Father Young until the matters were investigated.

The ladies entrusted money to Father Young, as treasurer of the Ladies' Guild. He was supposed to pay the light, water, telephone and other bills of the church.

Lately the church was presented with a \$7 telephone bill, a statement of \$21 for water and similar bills, which, it is alleged, have not been paid.
