Alexis to remain, when France asked him to abdicate so that the new government could be formed.

Fifty marines from cruiser Des Moines are on duty at the American consulate and the others on the ship are constantly ready for action.

General Simon, with his victorious army is within 25 miles of the city and is expected to arrive tomorrow. Couriers have been sent by President Legitime in order to ascertain his attitude toward the new government but no reply has been received. It is probable that General Simon's purpose will not be known until he reaches the city. If he chooses to take the government into his own hands, he probably could do so. His army is powerful enough to control the situation and he could enforce his rule.

President Legitime is receiving support from the French interests because he formerly was friendly toward France. The deposed president, Nord Alexis, remained aboard the French cruiser, Dugay Treuvin, where he took refuge yesterday. He will be taken on the cruiser to Jamaica, where he probably will take up his residence.

Troops.

Port Au Prince, Hayti, Dec. 3.—The loyal troops, who have been keeping order in the city, today were forced to fire upon many others, who were looting a big warehouse, and it is said that 12 were killed and a score wounded. The store house and residences of all the known friends of the deposed president, Alexis, are to be the objects of attacks, and the city today is practically under martial law, with General Poidevin in effect the military governor of the city.

Enraged at the escape of Alexis, mobs formed in the outlying sections and then marched through the business section. They smashed the doors of warehouses and goods were dragged into the streets. When the soldiers arrived the members of the mob were fighting among themselves over the spoils.

It is said that the soldiers did not wait until they were ordered, but fired on the street as soon as they reached that section of the city. An attack was made later on the seminary, where a number of officials had taken refuge, but troops were rushed to the scene, and dispersed the mob before much damage was done.

U. S. Keeps Out.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 3.—The state department officials today announced that the changes in Hayti are considered entirely internal matters, with which the United States has no right or desire to interfere. The only action to be taken by the United States is protection for the lives and property of American citizens.

river and harbor bill will be the biggest expenditure.

The American Federation of Labor will make a fight to separate labor unions from the provisions of the Sherman laws, and the modification of the injunction laws.

The temperance people are urging a measure authorizing dry states to prohibit the shipping of liquor into their territory.

No tariff bill will be presented at this session, but the inquiry has stirred up great tariff excitement among the senators and representatives, which will probably result in much oratory.

Sharp discussion of the banking law is certain, and amendments are possible.

The naval appropriations bill is likely to bring out a warm contest over expansion.

Postal savings banks and rural parcel delivery probably will be discussed at length.

The child labor law may come up before three holidays.

The criminal laws, in revised form, are ready for early discussion.

The senate has in its calendar of unfinished business a bill suspending the operation of the commodity clause of the railroad rate bill, which recently was declared unconstitutional by the United States circuit court at Philadelphia, and now is before the supreme court.

The senate, by special order, on December 15, will resume consideration of the bill to fix the statute of the negro soldiers discharged for alleged participation in the Brownsville affair.

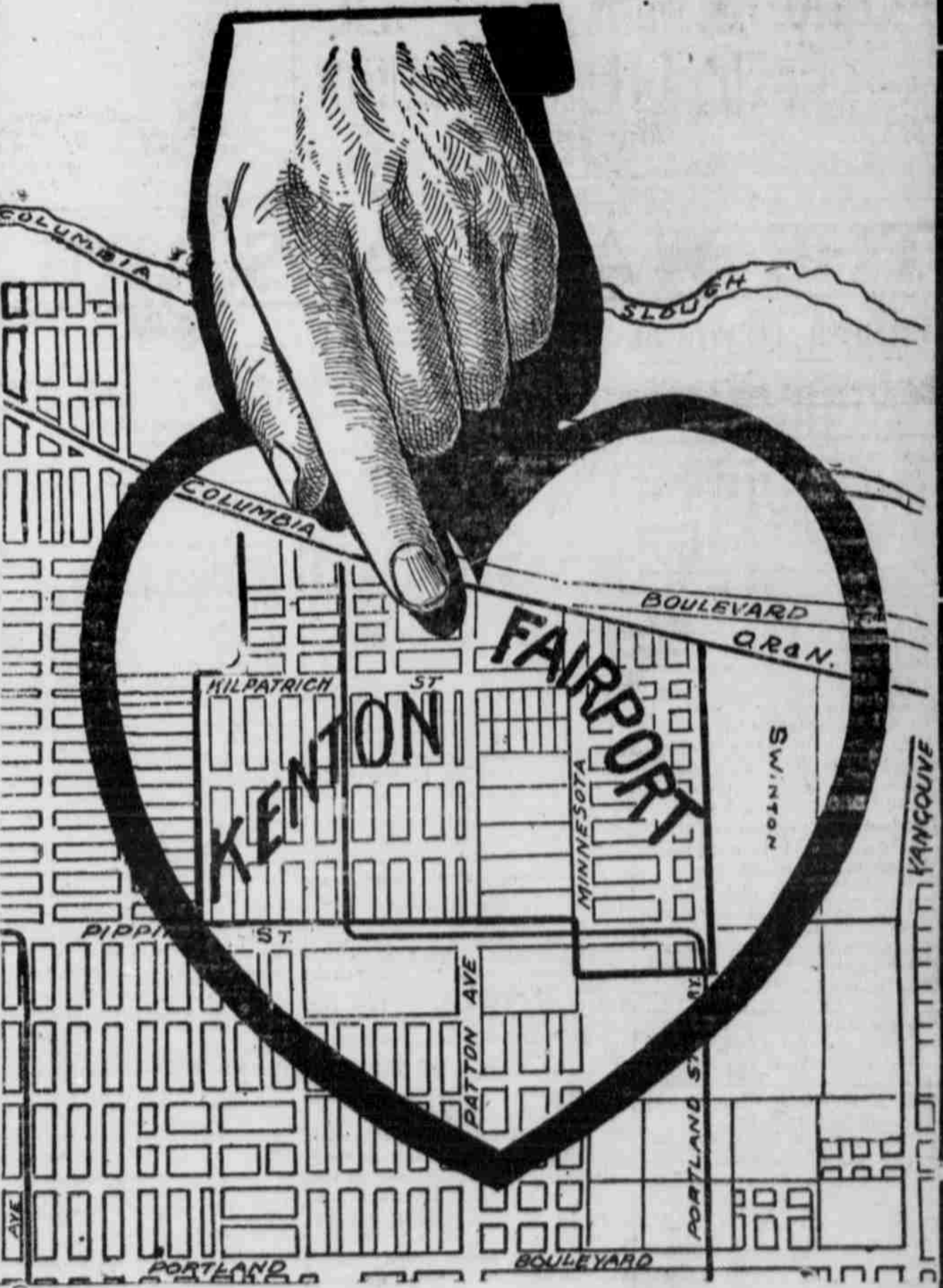

MILLIONAIRE'S SON
CONVICTED ROBBER

 Salinas, Cal., Dec. 3.—Charles J. Boyle, 22-year-old son of Henry Boyle, the San Rafael millionaire, will receive his sentence today, following a conviction of burglary yesterday afternoon.

Boyle, a member of the Twentieth United States infantry, was convicted of breaking into a store and stealing a revolver. After his arrest, a cache was found in the hills back of the Presidio of Monterey in which were hidden gloves, gaspips, slung shot and masks.

Boyle later confessed to having committed various crimes in San Rafael, including the holding up of 15 men in the barroom of the National Hotel, where, after shooting Constable Edwards, of Tiburon, he looted the cash register and escaped.

It has been claimed that Boyle was injured in a football game at school, and that he is irresponsible for his criminal acts.

DEFEATED PUGILIST
CHANGES MANAGER

 San Francisco, Dec. 3.—Billy Papke, the Illinois middle-weight who was defeated by Stanley Ketchel on Thanksgiving Day, has changed managers, casting off Tom Jones and taking on Sam Berger. Although Papke insists that he has only the kindest feelings toward Jones and that his action in terminating Jones' management of his affairs has been "only for business

reasons," friends of the young fighter say that he was disgusted with the treatment he received at the hands of his manager after the Thanksgiving Day battle. He expected \$12,000 as his share of that fight, and it is said he was thunder-struck when he was handed only \$8000.
 Jones has been getting a share of 15 per cent of all Papke's earnings, and he has been piecing out his income in whiskey drumming. He is now in Los Angeles whither Papke and Berger went last night on the Owl. Papke is scheduled to fight Hugo Kelly in the south.
