Boas, as the woman who might be the "friend" referred to in the mysterious letter of Dr. McHawer, said that she had not seen nor heard from Boas within two years.

"He was staying at my house two years ago," declared Mrs. Walker, "and was at that time employed by the Century Electric Company of San Jose. I believe he left for a position with the Independent Electric Company, of San Francisco."

Mrs. Walker then conducted a rooming house. She resides at 63 South Fifth street.

Died in Convulsions.
Dr. J. B. Clark examined Boas' body and performed an autopsy today in a vain effort to learn what killed Boas. "I found absolutely nothing to show the cause of death," said Dr. Clark. "The stomach showed that he had eaten a hearty meal. The stomach was even distended with food. There were no sign of the powders.

"The man might have died of strychnine, which leaves no trace, and it is also possible that he died of ptomaine poisoning. The cause of death will not be known until the analysis of the stomach is completed."

The condition of the body shows that Boas died in convulsions. His hands are clenched and every muscle is strained.

The catin, referred to in the letter which accompanied the powders, is a new chemical preparation adopted from the Guava, and is not recognized to any great extent by physicians.

NEW SCHOOL HOUSE

AT HAZEL GREEN
The petitions which were presented to the county commissioners a few weeks ago by tax payers and residents in the Hazel Green school district, asking for a new school house in addition to the present one, will not be taken up by the court any more, as a successful and satisfactory settlement was arrived at by the parties interested.

FINGER MARKS TAKEN OF DR ROBERTSON'S ASSAILANT

Warden Curtis, of the state penitentiary, at the request of Sheriff Harry Minto, took the finger impressions of Homer Black, the man who is charged with the shooting of Dr. Robertson, this morning. Sheriff Minto had this piece of work done for the purpose of identification, and will send a copy of the impressions to the identification bureau at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, which office has the records and necessary information of nearly every criminal of any repute in the United States.

The mode of identification, through impressions taken of the finger tips on a piece of paper, has just been installed during the past year in the Oregon penitentiary by Warden Curtis, and it has proven a great benefactor in the identification of criminal subjects. The system which Warden Curtis has established is the most accurate form of identification now practiced in the world. To take the finger impressions, it is first necessary to locate a certain spot upon which the fingers have been laid, after which a composition powder is applied to the place of contact by the fingers, and a perfect impression appears. Should the fingers be laid upon any black object, such as safe, a white powder is used, and on white objects the black powder is brought to bear. An impression can be obtained after a hand or fingers have touched a certain object a week hence with perfect accuracy.

The finger impression identification system has been put in use throughout every large criminal institution in the world, and has been

the means of capturing a good many of the smoothest law breakers.

It was first originated in England's Scotland Yard, from which place the outside world obtained the information. The most essential point in favor of the impressions, is that no one person's finger tip contains the same identical lines as that of another person, which fact has been taken from observations made in hundreds of cases.

ASK CITY CLOCK

BE LIGHTED UP
A petition has been tendered to the county commissioners signed by over a hundred taxpayers in this city, asking that the dials on the court house clock be illuminated in order that they may be seen at night as well as in the day time. The commissioners have not as yet taken the matter under advisement, but will probably do so at the present meeting.

ELECTRIC LIGHT FOR

NEW STATE BUILDINGS
The Portland Railway, Light & Power Co., have petitioned the court to grant them a permit to string wires from a junction point on the Turner road to the Oregon State Institute for the feeble minded for the purpose of transmitting electric energy, such as power and lights to be put in use by that institute. The petition was presented by Rollin K. Page, the local agent. The court has not acted on the matter as yet.

WANTS PERMIT

TO FLOAT LOGS
John G. Lals, of Silverton, has presented a petition to the county commissioners, asking that the court declare the little stream known as Silver Creek, running through the town of Silverton, a public highway, in order that he may float logs down the creek to his mill at Silverton from the mountainous country near the headwaters. The petition states that the land upon which the timber stands is so rough and mountainous that the transportation of logs otherwise than by water is impossible, and that the timber in question will scale 15,000 feet to the acre. The court still has the petition under advisement.

COULD NOT LOCATE

BUTTEVILLE ROBBER
After making a thorough search of the premises and adjacent country at Butteville, the place of robbery yesterday afternoon, Sheriff Minto could not locate the parties responsible for the crime. The robbers were of every description, and altogether made a haul of about \$150.
