FEAR ENGLISHMAN MET FOUL PLAY

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Chicago, Dec. 5.—Much mystery surrounds the disappearance from the Auditorium Annex Hotel of a man giving the name of Lord Herbert Russell, of Bridgeport, England, whose wife is said to be a former society girl of Spokane, Wash.

Mrs. Russell has sent a letter from Spokane to the local police saying that he had a large sum of money when he disappeared, and that she fears he met with foul play. Mrs. Russell's maiden name is unknown here, but her address in Spokane is said to be 304 Euclid avenue.

Russell is said to have come to America over a year ago, and went to Washington, where he said he was looking after investments made by Englishmen. It was while engaged in this pursuit that he met and married the Spokane woman.

He came to Chicago to look after the affairs of a syndicate, said to be interested in electric railways. He received a large remittance frequently, one having arrived on the day of his disappearance. Mrs. Russell went back to Spokane, fearing publicity, but after her arrival there decided to notify the police.

MAGOON WILL GET THE PLUM WILL BE SECRETARY OF WAR

Washington, Dec. 5.—Charles E. Magoon, provisional governor of Cuba, will be made secretary of war at the end of next year, according to the present program, the United Press is in a position to state today. It is planned for Secretary Wright to remain at the head of the department until that time.

Governor Magoon is a close personal friend of President-elect Taft. His work in Cuba was pleasing to Taft, who, when there as pacifier, had opportunity to observe Magoon's methods.

After his term as governor of the

island expires and Cuba is turned over to the new government on January 23, Magoon will make an inspection trip to the Philippines, remaining in the Orient six months. He then will return home and be made secretary of war.

President-elect Taft believes that it is impossible for any man to be successful as secretary of war who does not know personally the conditions in the Philippines.

Magoon was born in Minnesota on December 5, 1861. He studied and was admitted to the bar in Nebraska in 1882 and for a time was judge advocate of the Nebraska national guard. From 1889 to 1894 he occupied the post of law officer of the bureau of insular affairs of the war department, and, from 1904 to 1905, he was general counsel for the Isthmian Canal commission. On April 1 he was appointed governor. After that, for a year, he was American minister to Panama, and, since October 12, 1906, he has been provisional governor of Cuba.

Wood, widow of the former American manager of the Royal Insurance company, was looted of \$100,000 worth of jewelry, furs, garments and valuable paintings after the woman's body was found lifeless in the mansion at 132 North Broad street on the afternoon of October 13. Although the woman's death was reported as due to valvular heart depression. PROHIBS PLANNING CONTROL OF CITY AFFAIRS OF SALEM

GREAT BARGAINS IN MEN'S FURNISHINGS

REASONS WHY SALEM WILL BE A CITY OF TWENTY THOUSAND BY 1910

1. There is the greatest opportunity for expansion of the Capital City that was ever presented to any live Western community.
2. The Southern Pacific Railroad Company is planning to build fine new passenger and freight depots in this city.
3. The proper location for the passenger depot would be on the block east of the state house.
4. That block should be acquired by the state and cleared off and parked and lighted at night.
5. A modern passenger station with train sheds and other improvements suitable for a capital city is needed.
6. Then all who come to Salem or go through Salem on a passenger train over that transcontinental line would receive a favorable impression.
7. That would leave the freight station where it now is, and the switching and stock yards would be out at the present terminal.
8. The Oregon Electric system is to be extended to Albany. It should erect a fine passenger depot in the business heart of the city.
9. The Salem, Dallas and Falls City railroad is building from Salem to Dallas and will have cars running next summer.
10. It will bring twenty thousand new population into business relations with the Capital City.
11. The Salem, Albany, Eugene and Eastern Electric railroad will build two miles of track in Salem before May first.
12. A \$250,000 corporation is erecting its derricks to bore for oil just east of this city.
13. The Oregon Diamond Coal Mining Company is nearly through to the five-foot vein of coal located by them at Scotts Mills.
- 14.—The 100-ton smelter plant is being assembled to go into the Santiam mining district.
15. Five mining companies are piling up the ore and spending thousands of dollars on development work in the Santiam.
16. The Home Telephone Company is preparing to put in a plant here costing about \$100,000, to make Salem a great independent center.
17. The Spaulding Lumber Co. has made all arrangements to spend about \$100,000 on improvements in this city this coming year.
18. About \$100,000 worth of hard surface street paving is ordered done and the paving plant will be kept busy most of next year.
19. A permanent bridge will be built on South Commercial street, that will be a fine structure of steel and concrete.
20. The North Mill creek water power has been sold to the Portland Railway, Light and Power Co., and if given any encouragement will be developed.
21. A commission of fifteen men has been appointed and is working out the details of bringing in mountain water for the state institutions and the city.
22. The joint water plant owned by the state and city will cost not less than a million and a half.
23. There is strong probability that another cannery will be built at Salem, and another fruit evaporator and prune packing house is already building.
24. A five-story business block will be erected on the old Red front corner, possibly a Board of Trade building.
25. A fine new hotel is being planned and a syndicate formed to finance the same. It will be a modern structure in every way.
26. The state will probably take over the deaf-mute school for a hospital for tuberculosis patients from the asylum, and build a deaf-mute school in the city.
