BEST SKATERS TO HAVE RACE

Manager Fifer of the Auditorium roller rink has now got in touch with the managers of other rinks in the valley, and they have formed a Tri-City Racing Association for the present winter, and races will be pulled off at the local rink and the rinks in Dallas, Albany, Eugene, McMinnville and Woodburn by the best talent that can be selected by the managers in each of the respective towns.

The rink managers have made arrangements as follows for the purpose of picking out the speediest and best skaters to enter the circuit: A try-out will be given in each city, and the number of entrances will not be limited. Two of the most promising contestants will be given a place as representatives of the Tri-City races who will go over the circuit racing with pairs selected by other rink managers to be in the big contest.

On next Monday evening Manager Fifer of the local rink will select the two speediest skaters from the try-out which he will give to all those who wish to enter, and after the two men who are to represent Salem have been satisfactorily passed on, they will be sent out on the circuit to try for honors against other contestants. After each of the cities have had an exhibition of races, six out of the twelve circuit races will come to this city and enter a six-day contest. It has not yet been definitely stated as yet on what day the six-day race begins, but will probably be started by the first of next month.

PAYING

BANK'S LOSSES

SALEM MAN PAYS PROMPTLY

The residuary legatees of the Ford estate lose \$650 each by the failure of the Farmers' and Traders' National bank of La Grande. Wm. Kaiser is one of these legatees, and besides losing the value of their stock are required to pay \$650 each. The La Grande Observer has the following:

"The first payment on the 100 per cent assessment levied by the controller of the currency on stockholders in the defunct Farmers' and Traders' National bank, was recorded today from W. M. Kaiser, an attorney of Salem. Demonstrating as it does that funds with which to make subsequent dividend payments to the depositors are accumulating, it nevertheless has another significance, which will be noticed by bona fide stockholders who complain at the payment of a bona fide indebtedness. As is brought out in his letter, Mr. Kaiser is not a bona fide stockholder, though the account stands in his name. For all that, he is the first one of the stockholders to respond to the call for assessments and disregards the provision that would have made it possible for him to make partial payment on December 19 and wait several weeks after that to make full payment as the department permits. Kaiser's actions are magnanimous and highly commendable. So pleasing has the payment been to Receiver Niedner that he has forwarded a personal letter warmly expressing his thanks for liberality and precedent of the Salem attorney.

The letter is self-explanatory, and the depositors of the suspended bank owe it to themselves to be heartily thankful to the attorney who was willing to pay the heavy assessment under conditions which others would have objected to seriously:

Salem, Dec. 1, 1908.

Mr. Walter Niedner, Receiver of the Farmers' and Traders' National Bank, La Grande, Oregon.

Dear Sir: I herewith enclose you check in your favor for the sum of \$2000 in full payment of assessment on 20 shares of stock of said bank made by the comptroller, appearing in my name on the books of said bank. While the stock appears in my name I never owned any of it. Mr. Tilmon Ford, now deceased, paid for the same and had the same taken in my name, and the certificates of stock were endorsed in blank by me to him, but the transfer, I presume, was never made on the books of the bank. The whole of said bank stock belonged to Mr. Ford and is enumerated and set out in the inventory of his estate. Mrs. Dr. Angie L. Warren of Portland and myself are the co-executors of said estate, and therefore we herewith enclose you said check for the payment of said assessment against the said stock in full.

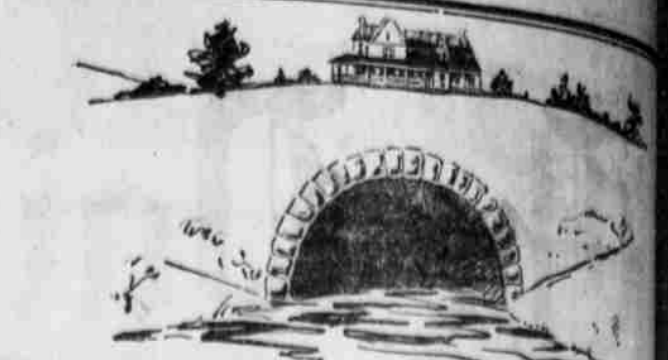
