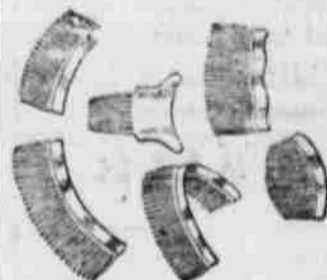

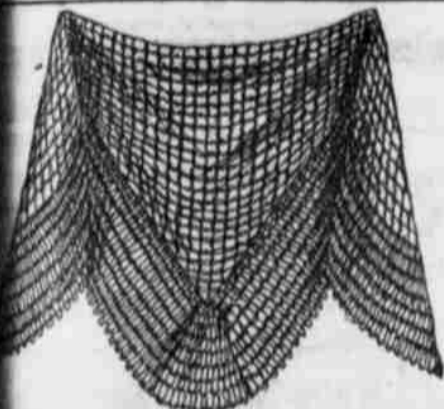

WIS TO EXPOSE ENEMIES

(United Press Leased Wire.) Indianapolis, Ind., Dec. 7.—Characterizing his enemies as character assassins and declaring them the enemies of the labor movement, President Lewis of the United Workers of America, in a speech today to the United Press, expressed his intention of exposing the names before the delegates of the national convention of the miners.

referring to the acts of his enemies in the organization President Lewis says: "Attention has been called to a number of articles designed to reflect on me personally as an enemy of the miners. These have been inspired by certain officers of the organization with the knowledge that there is not a scintilla of truth in the matter published.

These men who seek to promote their interests by assuming the character of character assassins are the worst enemies of the labor movement and of society in general.

I shall not at this time dignify individuals by naming them when the national convention marks will be torn off and the names of those men will be exposed.

PARADO SHOOT SHERIFF IN BACK

Deming, Nev., Dec. 7.—A group of angry deputies is today being led by Charles Barra, accused of shooting Deputy Sheriff William

Larkin yesterday morning at Riley's ranch, on Kings river, in the northern part of Humboldt county. Barra is said to have murdered the officer in cold blood, shooting him in the back.

The killing of Larkin is the outcome of a feud growing out of the shooting of a desperado named Taylor by Sheriff Lamb last June. Taylor tried to kill another man, and then escaped. He was followed by Lamb, and shot when he refused to surrender. Taylor's friends accused Larkin of betraying the hiding place of the desperado; and Barra, in particular, was so indignant that he swore to kill the deputy on sight.

FUNERAL OF THE LATE JOHN MORLOCK

The remains of J. Morlock arrived this morning on the 5:13 a. m. train from San Francisco, accompanied by two of his daughters. The funeral was held at 2 p. m. from Rigdon undertaking parlors on Court street. Rev. Phil J. Baner conducting the services. Burial was had beside the remains of his wife in the Rural cemetery. There was a large attendance of friends of the deceased who was highly esteemed. Mr. Morlock was a public spirited citizen and made many warm friends during his residence in this city. He several times in his life made large fortunes but lost them again in speculations. By nature he was of a social disposition and in politics he was a Democrat.

Mrs. Minnie Gibson, wife of Chief of Police Gibson, died at the home 497 South Capital street, shortly after 12 o'clock last night of throat troubles, which had baffled the efforts of four physicians, called in consultation.

PRUNE MEN COMPLAIN OF RATES

A communication has been received by the Railroad Commission from A. C. Burdick & Co., large prune dealers of Portland, saying that notice has been given too the effect that the rate on dried fruits will be advanced on Oregon lines on the first of the year from the present rate of \$1.99 to \$1.10.

The Burdick people protest strongly on this advance in rates, which are now imposed on the minimum weight cars of 20 tons. During the time when the fruit industry was in its infancy, states the communication, the railroad company solicited the trade of the fruit growers on their freight lines, and gave the minimum weight car of 12 tons, but later they have gradually raised the weight to 15 tons, and are now compelling the fruit men to take the service of a 20-ton car. It is apparent that the 20-ton car is too large for the dried fruit shipments, which are hardly large enough to properly necessitate so large a car.

The letter also states that the present rate in rates will be largely responsible for the decrease in the fruit business in Oregon, and that at the present time several of the farmers are digging up their trees, unable to meet the circumstances involved through shipments.

The commission has taken the matter under advisement.

Mistaking a glass of gasoline for water and holding a cigarette in his hand resulted in the death of a San Bernardino, Cal., prospector. Samuel R. Claypool, who came to Linn county in 1846, died at his home in Albany yesterday, at the age of 72 years.

Four were drowned while skating at Janesville, Wis. A train dispatcher at Thompson, Mont., was found guilty of manslaughter for causing a wreck in which several were killed. The American fleet yesterday passed Singapore.
