They were unable to get sufficient evidence against him to warrant any action, however, and he was allowed to proceed with the ship on her visit to Puget Sound. On the return down the coast the stokers found several valuable pieces of jewelry in the oal bunkers. Captain William Campbell at once suspected Johnson of having stolen them, and had him locked up.
