

# IMPROVEMENTS ON WILLAMETTE

The Oregon City Transportation Co. is now making final preparations for the water business between the different towns along the river, as far up as Corvallis. The company has made vast improvements to their warehouses and stopping places along the Willamette, in order to afford the best of accommodations to the shippers and to the passenger public in general. Several of their docks were washed out during last winter, or damaged considerably.

The help to operate the river boats this season is abundant, such as deck hands, cooks and stewards, and the company have undergone no difficulty so far in filling up their working force this season, as was the case last.

The government dredge and snag puller, Mathaloma, deserves high praise from the navigation company for the splendid work they accomplished on the stream between here and Portland. In former years the Willamette river was in such a condition that the boats were meeting with difficulties on every trip. Sand and gravel bars were arising above the surface in many places, and these, combined with the collection of large snags at different points, made steamboating an almost impossible undertaking, especially during the low water season. The Mathaloma removed all these hindrances, at the urgent request of the boat people and their patrons, and travel is comparatively easy now.

The O. C. T. Co. boats began the season of heavy traffic in good shape, and are withstanding the extra work in fine condition. The hop shipments are now coming in thick and fast from the upper river country, and these, in connection with the potato shipments and hay, give the boat people all the work they can handle. The passenger service on the river now has been made more convenient and steamers arriving from above carry good-sized passenger lists. The passenger trade coming from points

along the river toward Portland is also picking up wonderfully. The Willamette has not as yet raised to a steady boating stage, owing to the dry weather, but, from appearances, the river people expect to be able to make regular trips up river before long.

## STATE UNIVERSITY NEWS.

Engineering hall, the new university building ordered erected by the board of regents, has been completed and will be occupied by the department of civil engineering during the Christmas holidays. The building is large and commodious and is situated directly across from Mechanical hall on the east side of University avenue. It contains about a dozen large rooms, two of which are drafting and computing rooms, 30x40 feet in size, and is built on most approved plans for the purposes desired. The addition of these rooms will relieve in a measure the crowded condition of the other buildings.

The University of Oregon Glee and Mandolin clubs appeared in the Eugene theater before the largest crowd that ever assembled in the Eugene playhouse. The clubs had been touted as the best ever turned out by the university and the audience was in no wise disappointed. Professor I. M. Glen took the solo parts, as he will be in the tour over the state, and the work of the clubs and the stunt men was of the highest grade. They have been called on for another Eugene concert after the Christmas tour.

It has been definitely decided that some time during the spring the university will celebrate "Commonwealth Day." Thousands of invitations will be sent to all parts of the state and the most prominent speakers of Oregon will be on the program. It is hoped to make this an annual day for the state. A committee is already working on the program and the plans for the day. "Commonwealth Day" will be held at a time when the university is in session in order to give a large number of people a chance to see the university as it actually is.

The faculty of the university of Oregon has passed a strong resolution against playing the annual Oregon-O. A. C. game any place else than on the campuses of the two institutions.
