ATELL FACES CRISIS TONIGHT

Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 11.—If Abe Attell has not gone backward he should whip Ad Wolgast at Naul Junction pavillon tonight. The boys are to meet in aschedule 10-rounder which bids to be a hummer while it lasts.

Although Attell is an 8 to 10 favorite over Wolgast, the latter has lots of friends who believe that he will lay the present champion low. There is not much briskness in the betting market. Nettled by his loss to Welsh and suggestions that he may soon be fighting preliminaries, Attell has been training with a vengeance at the East Side club with Dick Hyland. Hyland himself is anxious to meet Welsh, but the latter is paying no attention to him.

Attell's victory over Wolgast would send the Attell stock soaring again as Wolgast has made a good impression here since his arrival.

Wolgast knocked out Danny Webster in 18 rounds, and stored away Young Kid McCoy in two. Although he appears to lack the cleverness of Attell, he is wonderfully strong in physique, besides possessing a knock-out punch.

"Aw, you know me, he might land it on a sucker, but not on me." This was Attell's expression yesterday after he had finished his day's work. Abe professes to believe that Wolgast will not be able to land on him.

In addition to the main events there have been arranged two preliminaries.

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DESPERADO KILLS FOUR NEGROS AND WOUNDS THREE OTHERS

Memphis, Tenn., Dec. 11.—Apparently without the slightest provocation, and certainly without the least warning, William Latura, a desperado with a record of having killed and wounded a score of people, shot up a dive full of negroes today, killing four and wounding three more, one of them fatally.

Latura, with a number of companions, had been standing at the bar, drinking. He seemed to have no particular grudge against anybody in the house, and his action in begu-

ning the fray was impossible for his friends to understand.

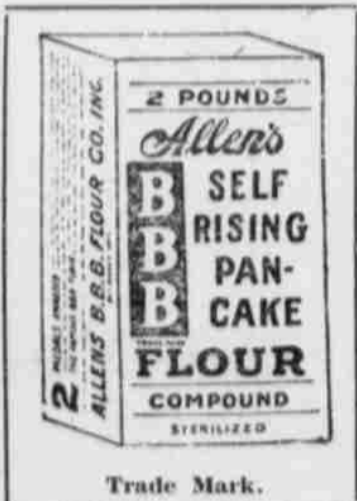
Without saying a word to them, he turned suddenly and fired his revolver into the crowd of colored men in the barroom. Before he could be stopped, he had emptied every weapon in his possession. Then, when every negro in the room had fallen, killed or wounded he coolly pocketed his guns and departed. As soon as the dazed crowd could collect its wits officers were sent after Latura, who was arrested in another part of the town, giving himself up without a struggle.

GASTRO EATS LIKE WELLS

Bordeaux, Dec. 11.—Castro, of Venezuela, shot at 11 o'clock this morning. It is believed that he will be operated on at the French hospital instead of in Germany, where death of Dr. Israel, of Paris, was to have performed the operation. The reason for the operation is not known. It is reported that Castro ate and drank profusely while here, and gave indication that on his visit he was seeking anything but his life.
