(United Press Leased Wire.) Ogden, Utah, Dec. 11.—While setting type at 3 o'clock this morning, P. M. Jonas, a linotype operator, formerly of San Francisco and Omaha, dropped dead of heart failure at his machine. He was found in the morning when the printing office was opened.

### AIR POLLUTED BY IMMENSE THROGS

(United Press Leased Wire.) New York, Dec. 11.—Madison Square Garden, where the six-day bicycle racers are nearing their close, was aired today and all the spectators were required to leave the building while the atmosphere of the place was purified. This was done in order to prevent the health authorities from ending the races.

The riders were much refreshed by the innovation, and the wearied racers went at their work again with renewed vigor. The score stood thus:

### OPPOSING 'FRISCO IN WATER SUPPLY FIGHT

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, D. C., Dec. 11.—There is serious trouble ahead for San Francisco before she perfects her claims to the Heth Hetchy valley water rights, according to the statement made today by a high official of the interior department. This means that the monster \$45,000,000 undertaking still is far from the beginning of actual work. Congressman Needham will demand that the city provide power to replace any lack of water that may be caused by dams above the Turlock and Modesto irrigation country. The representatives of the Spring Valley Water Company are here to make a fierce fight against the project, which would render their property worthless. They will claim that San Francisco's charter does not give it right to exchange lands with the government

### POISON WHEN FIANCE WOULD NOT KISS HER

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Dec. 11.—Believing that her sweetheart no longer loved her, May Clifford, a vaudeville actress, swallowed bi-chloride of mercury early today in her apartments at the Hotel St. Rose, and is in a precarious condition at the Central Emergency Hospital.

Miss Clifford swallowed the poison after her fiancée, Richard Rawley, with whom she is appearing in a vaudeville sketch, had refused to kiss her good night.

The girl rushed from him crying that he no longer loved her, and swallowed the drug. Rawley attempted to give her antidote, but the girl refused, and the refusal may cost her life.

### SEATTLE CONCERNS TO BUILD SUBMARINES

(United Press Leased Wire.) Seattle, Wash., Dec. 11.—In all probability four of the eight submarines authorized at the last session of congress will be built by the Moran Company, of Seattle. According to contracts awarded yesterday, at least two of the sub-marines will be constructed at the local yards, and word received by J. V. Patterson, vice-president and general manager of the Moran Company, indicates that it is more than likely that the entire four awarded for construction on the Pacific coast will be turned out at the local yards.

It is stated that the bids of the Electric Boat Company, of Quincy, Mass., was accepted for building four, to be delivered at the Mare Island navy yard. This company assigned its contract to Moran Bros.

final summing up for the prosecution, said:

"Yesterday's victory means more to San Francisco than a score of triumphs in warfare. We have discovered that our law is a sham and our administration of justice a travesty. Ruef's race is run. His conviction sounds the death knell of his system and that of his accomplices—public service corporations—the system by which a political boss sells privileges and rights which belong to all the people. Henceforth Ruef's personality will be eliminated from this city."

District Attorney Langdon said: "The public is familiar with the evidence presented by the people in the Ruef case. From that evidence it was apparent that no honest jury could do other than find a verdict of guilty. The conviction of Ruef is but a forerunner of other convictions. The graft prosecutions will go on until it is demonstrated that San Francisco is capable of enforcing its laws and that courts and juries are not a mockery and a sham. The arch criminal of San Francisco is now on his way to the penitentiary."

Detective William J. Burns said: "The verdict rendered by the jury in the Ruef case is a vindication of the people of San Francisco—the law-abiding people of the city. The conviction clearly demonstrated that once public opinion is aroused the people can be depended upon. This verdict shows that right-minded honest men cannot fail to discern the guilt of Abe Ruef. The howling pro-graft press, that has been a stumbling block to the prosecution of crime in this city, must read in that verdict the signs of the times. It was plainly the people's victory."

### KEEP BODY UNLESS EXPENSES ARE PAID

(United Press Leased Wire.) Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 11.—After refusing to pay the Pacific College of Osteopathy \$15 for the remains of John Ahlin, his cousin, Oscar Anderson, a Southern Pacific fireman, who lives at 1732 Ninth street, West Oakland, is today trying to induce the authorities to force the institution to surrender the corpse. Anderson has prepared to give his cousin's body a decent burial.

When Ahlin, who was also known as August Allen, died at the county hospital, September 23, the county authorities awaited the prescribed three days, and then, no relatives having appeared to claim it, the body was given to the College of Osteopathy.

Anderson came to Los Angeles and asked that he be allowed to take the remains. Dr. C. A. Whiting, head of the college, informed the fireman that he could have the body, but must pay \$15 to cover the expense of embalming and keeping it.

Going to the district attorney's office, Anderson was advised to sign an affidavit showing his relationship to Ahlin. This document, however, failed to alter Dr. Whiting's view of the case, and today he said he was firmly determined not to surrender the body unless the \$15 was paid. Anderson said that he had already expended \$65 in arranging for the funeral, and that he would not pay the college a cent.
