PAVING FEVER HAS TAKEN THE DALLES

(Dalles Chronicle.)

The street paving ball has commenced to roll nicely and the indications are that by a year from the present date it will have rolled so well that all the mud on the streets of the city below the bluff will be rolled up with it.

Everything points to the fact that every thoroughfare in The Dalles below the bluff will be paved next year. The committee composed of prominent business men and property holders appointed to investigate the proposition by Mayor E. M. Wingate, held another meeting at the council chambers last night. The sessions was a most enthusiastic one. The members of the committee are more enthusiastically in favor of the improvement of the streets than ever before.

It was decided at the meeting last night not to circulate the petition among the property holders, asking that the streets be paved, until the matter was more fully looked into. The committee is considering two kinds of paving for the thoroughfares here, bitulithic and hassam. The members of the committee agreed to write to the Oregon Hassam Paving Company and the Warren Brothers Construction Company, asking that experts be sent here to estimate the cost of the different kinds of pavement.

It is practically assured that either bitulithic or hassam paving will be used in this city for the improvement of the streets. The Oregon Hassam Paving Company guarantees that the cost of its paving will not be more than \$2 per square yard. In The Dalles the expense of this pavement would be still less, due to the fact that the thoroughfares already have a suitable foundation for the construction of pavements.

One of the heaviest property holders of the city, in speaking of the matter of the improvement of the streets of the city, said this afternoon:

"The strongest argument in favor of paving all of the thoroughfares of The Dalles below the bluff is to point out the miserable condition of the streets today after a little rain. When a man notices how bad the condition of them really is now, and one could not help noticing the poor streets, I do not see how he could be opposed to the proposed improvement. It really is something fierce.

The time has surely come to pave and I say, improve all of the thoroughfares below the bluff at the same time. It can be done a whole lot cheaper that way and it really is the only thing to do. By bonding the property the owners will have a number of years, if they like, to pay the cost, and this method should not be hard on any one.

"A year from now I think every street in the city below the hill will be nicely improved and then we will not be ashamed to have the president himself visit the city. Street paving will do more for this city in its up-building and progress than anything else that might be suggested.

EZRA MEEKER TO LIVE OLD LIFE AGAIN

Ezra Meeker, pioneer of the fifties, who in 1852 drove an ox team to the far northwest over the Oregon trail, will give an exact reproduction of home life during the early history of the northwest on the grounds of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition in Seattle next year.

Five cabins will be erected on the fair site without the use of lumber or nails and ash pits be built at convenient places on Meeker's acre on the exposition grounds, a vegetable garden will be planted, and by next spring there will be a flourishing pioneer colony on the campus of the state university.

A part of this exhibit will be an old block house built in 1855 which still stands at Soupeville, says the Seattle Times. There is to be a reproduction of the school house of fifty years ago, and John V. Meeker, eighty-four years old and known as "Uncle John" among the pioneers, will be in charge of the building. In early days John Meeker taught school and many of the text-books of that period have been preserved by the Meekers.

Ezra Meeker will try to interest

the newspapers of Oregon in his pioneer exhibit and hopes to receive many relics of early days from old Oregon families. These relics will be exhibited in the cabins and at the close of the exposition returned to their owners. In the cabins will be shown how cloth was spun and woven, and several old-time spinning wheels and looms will be in operation.

One cabin will be called the music hall, where several old melodeons will be used. These instruments were among the first to be taken to this coast. In early days the Oregon country comprised the vast territory of what are now the states of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and a part of Wyoming and Montana. From all of these states will come relics of early pioneer life for the Meeker exhibit.

Meeker plans a number of special features during the life of the exposition, and every few weeks there will be a big barbecue in which exposition visitors will be asked to take a part. There will also be clam bakes, and Meeker expects to serve thousands of potatoes baked in the ash pits. Oxen will be roasted for the benefit of the visitors, and it is possible that many pioneers from the old Oregon country will be in attendance to participate in the special days planned by Meeker.

When this part of the country was under provincial government as far back as 1843 the seat of government was in a cabin. There is to be a reproduction of this same cabin, and the details of its construction will be gathered from old Oregon pioneers.

Over all the cabins will fly the American flag containing only twenty-six stars, the number of states in the Union at that period of the country's history.

Meeker has been given a location just south of the music pavilion, and he expects to commence the task of building the cabins within a very few weeks. About the cabins will be planted flowers, and in one part will be a hop yard. Poultry and cattle will be exhibited in one portion of the acre set aside as a pioneer stockyard.
