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### INDICT 10,000 WOMEN

#### FOR CONTEMPT OF COURT

San Sebastian, Spain, Dec. 16.—Ten thousand Spanish women in Bilbao are being tried today on a charge of contempt of court, the accusation against them being that they signed a petition in sympathy for Josusa Pajana, a handsome girl, who was sentenced to eight years' imprisonment for killing her faithless fiance. Indignant at the lauding of the young woman by thousands of her sex, the public prosecutor caused the whole sale indictment of the signers of the petition. The interest in the case is wide-spread throughout all Spain. The streets were packed with hissing crowds today when the documents in the case, loaded on three vans, made their journey to the court house. The crowds of Spanish women in the court house made the place look more like a beauty contest than a public tribunal.

### CASTRO IS HAVING A GOOD TIME

#### IS TREATED WELL BY GERMANS

Berlin, Dec. 16.—President Castro, of Venezuela, thinks Berlin is great. He is so delighted with his reception here that he announced his intention today to prolong his visit in the German capital, and to distribute among the Kaiser's subjects the money which he had originally intended to spend in Paris. The Ten'ons haven't snubbed the trouble-making little president of the South American republic. Emperor Wilhelm sent him the imperial greetings, and several big officials have graciously consented to allow him to call on them. The crowds on the street have given him his share of attention, and Castro likes attention—if it isn't too rough. Grateful for such notice, Castro waxed generous today, and announced grand eloquently that he was "perfectly willing now to spend a quarter of a million dollars before leaving." He expects to make the ordinary splendor look miserly. Just to run a trial heat in extravagance, he issued orders that a small regiment of German haberdashers should be ushered into his presence, to show him their choicest samples in neckwear, vests, colored silk socks, novelties in hats and fancy shirts. When the haberdashers and tailors got through with him, he expects to burst on astonished Berlin in dazzling array.

### ADDRESS TO JURORS IS BEGUN

#### PROGRESS IN TRIAL OF HAINS

Flushing, L. I., Dec. 16.—Setting an unique record in the history of murder trials in New York state, Special Prosecutor Elmer White today nonplussed the court and opposing counsel by reading his opening address to the jury which will try Thornton Jenkins Hains for murder. Prosecutor White said that the prosecution would endeavor to show the jury that the part Jenkins Hains took in the shooting of William E. Annis by Captain Peter C. Hains constituted murder in the first degree. He rehearsed the events of the shooting of Annis at the Bayside Yacht Club pier; dwelling particularly on the part played by defendant in keeping back at pistol point, those who would interfere with the attack on Annis. White referred to the letters received by the Recreation Magazine publishers, by whom Annis was employed, showing the defendant's animosity for the dead man. During the argument, Hains sat near his counsel nonchalantly opening and perusing his mail. White dramatically rehearsed the details of the shooting, relating how Annis, in bathing costume, was in a catboat and had reached a float when Captain Hains drew his pistol from a holster. Captain Hains, standing on the pier, first thrust his pistol in the face of a bystander named Harway who was a member of the Bay View Yacht club, then recognizing Annis. Then he fired at the unarmed man below him. He pictured Annis, shot six times, struggling in the water, into which he had toppled from the boat. How the bleeding man was dragged from the water by Robert and Edwin Andrews and laid on the float. White declared that the captain was disarmed and that Jenkins Hains stood by still swinging his revolver and saying, "The first man to make a move is a dead man." He said that Downs, a club member, rushed out on the float demanding to know who fired the shot and whether he was present. White said the defendant replied: "Yes, here. Stand back. Get the police, this is an affair for them." The captain told Downs that he did the shooting and that there would be more of it. White related the incidents immediately following and said that when the police arrived and inquired who fired the shot, the defendant replied, indicating the captain and himself, "We are the men." The speaker declared that when the officer started to take the captain to the spot where Annis lay for identification by his dying victim, the defendant interposed, saying: "You don't have to take him over there, we admit it." White declared that premeditated murder would be proved. At the conclusion of White's remarks, Attorney McIntyre for the defense moved that the first and second counts of the indictment, charging Jenkins Hains with partic-

### TRYING TO PROVE WILSON MURDERER

San Francisco, Dec. 16.—The greater part of the morning session of the coroner's inquest into the death of Harry Boas, who was mysteriously killed by strychnine, sent to him through the mails, was occupied by the introduction of evidence produced in an effort to show that John Walter Wilson, the man suspected of sending the poison, was an adept at forging letters, and altering postmarks on letters. A letter from Nina Miller, of Oakland, reputed to be the sweetheart of the suspected man, was placed before the jury. The writing on the envelope had been changed, presumably by Wilson. Assistant District Attorney Duke endeavored to prove that it was changed to mislead Wilson's mother, to whom the letter was addressed. The police also claim to have a font of type found in Wilson's room, which could have been used to imitate postmarks. They will endeavor to show that Wilson altered postmarks on letters, but for what purpose, has not yet been ascertained. The testimony of Florence Carl and Ella Houston, domestics employed at the Hotel Netherland, in this city, proved of less importance than was expected. Previously the women had told Duke that they were positive that the letter paper on which was written the instruction to Boas to take the poison was the same paper they had seen in Wilson's room. On the witness stand both were not so sure that the paper was the same, but qualified their former stories by saying that it resembled that of the fatal missive.

### Guilty of Manslaughter

Butte, Mont., Dec. 16.—Arthur Bryan, of Cincinnati, O., was found guilty of manslaughter today after a trial on a charge of killing George Morhard, a restaurant proprietor here last September. Bryan stabbed Morhard in a quarrel over the purchase of wild ducks. He claimed that he killed the restaurant man in self defense.

### Chamberlain Expected

### Snow in Portland

Portland, Or., Dec. 16.—When Portlanders emerged from their homes early today they were just a bit disappointed because they could find no traces of the "beautiful snow" that had wrapped the city in a white mantle last night. ### TRAINS CRASH IN FRENCH TUNNEL

#### Ten Are Killed and Many Hurt in Collision.

Limoges, France, Dec. 16.—Ten passengers killed and a score hurt, some of them fatally, is the record of a disastrous collision today between a passenger train and a freight train in a tunnel near this city.
