COLD STORAGE PLANT IN SALEM

F. G. Deckbach, vice-president and general manager of the Salem Brewery Association, appeared before the Marion County Horticultural Society, which met at the Board of Trade rooms yesterday, and announced that his company would begin construction immediately after the first of the year a modern cooling station for the general fruit produce from six to ten cars of fruit at one time, and will be in order to receive fruit by next spring. Mr. Deckbach is highly enthusiastic over this new move, and he has the hearty cooperation of all the members of the horticultural society here, and should the dimensions not be sufficient to handle the fruit, the building will be enlarged accordingly.

This new structure will be an important factor to the local fruit men, who undergo so much trouble in the warm months in retaining fresh and wholesome fruits, and the Eastern and Southern California markets will not be required if Marion county fruit can be put on the local market in favorable condition.

SCHMITZ' RELATIVES GO ON HIS BOND

San Francisco, Dec. 18.—Instead of employing a surety company to arrange his bond, former Mayor Eugene Schmitz has decided to accept the services of a number of his relatives and intimate friends, and District Attorney Langdon is today investigating the list which Schmitz's lawyer, Frank C. Drew, presented him yesterday. Schmitz has had a hard time finding sureties in the last few weeks, ever since William Dingo, the former "cement king," was financially unable to remain on his bond.

NEW MEN WAY TO EXPEND LEGISLATURE GETS

(United Press Leased Wire.)
San Francisco, Dec. 18.—The state legislature, at Sacramento, next month, will probably have a variety of praying, enough to satisfy the most particular lawmaker. The leaders of both houses are now seriously discussing the proposition of installing six chaplains instead of two, and the tentative list includes a Roman Catholic priest, a Jewish Rabbi, an Episcopalian and pastors from the Methodist, Presbyterian and Baptist denominations.

This innovation, which is proposed, has its inception in the incident at the last session two years ago, when Senator Edward I. Wolfe, of San Francisco, a member of the Jewish faith, made formal objection to the use of the name of Jesus Christ in the invocation of the senate chaplain. He said that this prevented him from participating in the opening devotions of the upper house.

Out of deference to his feelings, the chaplain dropped the use of the Saviour's name, but this caused a storm of protest to come from the Protestant ministers throughout the state. The bewildered chaplain once more introduced the name of Christ into his prayers, whereupon Wolfe solved the question for himself by remaining out of his seat until the religious exercises in the senate ended.

HURT IN AUTO RACING TRAIN

Tacoma, Wash., Dec. 18.—In trying to beat the Northern Pacific "Sage Brush Flyer" from Sunnyside to North Yakima, in a race to file on government land, which was thrown open yesterday, Newton and Arthur Dennis, of Prosser, met with an automobile accident, which spoiled their plans to be the first on the scene ahead of their rivals.

The machine was speeding along at a breakneck speed in the dark hours of the morning, when it hit a sand bank eight miles east of Sunnyside. It overturned, and all the occupants were spilled out.

Arthur Dennis later arrived at Yakima by train with a broken arm as a souvenir of his adventure. He declared himself convinced that a "hoodoo" interfered with his efforts to procure this or any other government land, and he said he was willing to quit trying.
