while most serious at the capital has been growing in southern Venezuela where two generals of the Venezuelan army have been assassinated.

As yet no seaport town has thrown off its allegiance to the Castro administration but the situation at La Guayra, Maracaibo, and Porto Cabello is serious for the followers of Castro and the Dutch ships are within close proximity of those ports.

Castro Buying Ammunitions of War. Berlin, Dec. 19.—After receiving a cablegram today that Vice-President Vincente Gomez has declared himself president of Venezuela, President Castro opened negotiations for the purchase of 50,000 rifles, and other munitions.

Dr. Israel, his physician, has insisted on absolute rest for the South American and Castro will be removed to a sanitarium tomorrow. Castro has rented the entire sanitarium for one week.

SAY THAT PRINTER

GRAFTS UNCLE SAM

(United Press Leased Wire.)

San Francisco, Dec. 19.—Moses D. Callen, a railway postal clerk, who is doing the printing for the local division of the railway mail service, admits that he is breaking a rule of the postoffice department in engaging in a private printing contract for the Sterling Furniture company. The rule in question forbids mail clerks from using their spare time in transacting other business.

The postal regulations say that clerks who disregard this rule shall be liable to removal, and an investigation is taking place today to ascertain what is the status of the odd case.

Callen, both in his private and public work uses free light and power in the postoffice building, but Division Superintendent A. H. Stephens is quoted as saying that this must be allowed, as "the government could not hire a printing plant for \$1.50 on any other terms."

Those who object against Callen's private activities say that, with the aid of light and power furnished by Uncle Sam, he has been able to underbid union printers for commercial work.
