### CONSTRUCT

#### MILES OF SEAWALL

San Francisco, Dec. 21.—Plans are being made today for reconstruction of the 10,000 feet of seawall, which will be made to resist the action of the bay tides that are threatening the present structure. The seawall along the water front from the Golden Gate to Jones has been damaged by Assistant State Engineer Barker, and the harbor committee are considering the cost of the proposed repair. The seawall is the foundation of the city building, which, owing to the reconstruction, is safe from the sea. Other places in the wall, which are in a bad way, and the seawall of warehouses along the waterfront are threatened.
