MARION COUNTY GRANGERS FOR LOCKS AND CANALS

Following Resolutions Were Adopted Saturday by Salem Grange and Recommended for Similar Action by Pomona Grange.

Resolved, That Salem Grange wishes to express its hearty sympathy and support of the movement to make the Willamette river open to navigation, including free locks and canal at Oregon City by co-operation of the state and nation.

"We favor sustaining provisional legislation of this state in appropriating money to secure free locks and canal, and extending the time for appropriation to give the federal government all the time necessary to acquire the locks and canal at Oregon City and maintain them forever for the people of Oregon.

"We are convinced that the tolls collected by the private corporation owning the locks and canal are the heaviest tax upon the producers of Western Oregon. The charge of 50 cents per ton on freight and 25 cents per passenger is not only collected from traffic on the river, but added as a charge upon all freight and passengers handled by the railroads."

On motion representatives and senators from Marion county were invited by Salem Grange to attend the next session of Pomona Grange Wednesday afternoon.

JESSE LOONEY, PIONEER, PASSES ON

Jesse Walton Looney, one of the best known residents of the Willamette valley and brother of N. H. Looney, superintendent of the reform school in this city, died of typhoid fever at his home in Jefferson, Friday, December 25, 1908, at 3:30 p. m. The deceased was 68 years of age.

With his father, Jesse Looney, he came to Oregon in 1843. His father settled in the valley near Jefferson and many of the children were reared there. The father was one of the most prominent of the Oregon pioneers who shaped a new country out of a practical wilderness and his sons and daughters have figured largely in the development of the state.

Jesse Walton Looney was a farmer near Jefferson and had ever been actively engaged in the development of his section and of Oregon. He is survived by four brothers, four sisters and three children. The sons are Fred, Frank and Walton Looney. The sisters are Mrs. Cornell of Salem, who is connected in an official capacity with the asylum; Mrs. Fairbanks of Tetaluma, Mrs. Ellen Gaines of Los Angeles and Miss Pauline Looney of Jefferson.

The funeral was held at 12:30 o'clock Sunday from the Methodist church at Jefferson and interment was had in Jefferson cemetery.

GERMAN VEREIN CELEBRATE

AN OLD FASHIONED CHRISTMAS

The German Verein of this city celebrated Christmas Sunday afternoon at their hall on State street, with speech and song, with refreshments for the children and ladies of cakes and boxes of candy for all.

The principal address was by Rev. Hopf on the Christmas tree and the German customs connected therewith. He said every German home had a Christmas tree, and 15 to 20 million trees were cut each year for this purpose.

He showed that instead of being a custom destructive to the forests, the Christmas trees were cut so as to thin out the second-growth and promote the growth of the forests. By pruning out trees where they were too thick, the rest of the trees made a better growth.

The evergreen of the Christmas tree told of coming spring amid the snows and ice of mid-winter. The tree was beautifully decorated with emblems representing brotherhood, mercy and love. When the gifts were distributed there was a very happy crowd of young German-Americans.

The committee in charge of the program were Messrs. Stellman, Henmburg and Deckabach. A beautiful Christmas cake covered with frosting and a heart with roses was inscribed "Vivate Deutscher Verein." This masterpiece of baking was a work of art from the little German Bakery.

Mrs. Koepflein sang a solo, "Die Weihnachts Glocke," to piano accompaniment and was heartily applauded. The exercises closed with singing of "Die Wacht Am Rhein," the audience of 200 people joining in the singing.
