ALASKA: THE GREAT COUNTRY

A New Book by Mrs. Ella Higginson, the Poetess of Washington.

"Alaska, the Great Country," is the latest work from the pen and brain of Ella Higginson. It is also

from the heart, as no one could imagine that great woman, whose birthplace was the Willamette valley, leaving her heart out of any work she did.

In the wordwork she tells of the great struggle, in face of the bitterest opposition, made by Seward and Sumner, to secure for the United States this "most glorious possession

of any people." Before this charming writer has proceeded two pages she has charmed us with the Alaska charm as she herself was charmed into charming utterances like "the curl of the satin waves and the musical kiss of their cool and faltering lips." So on through the whole first chapter, which ends in a sunburst of word coloring, describing the straits of Juan de Fuca: "but nowhere have they such softly burning, milky-rose opaline effects as on this inland sea." Like George Hickens in his glowing descriptions of Egypt, she revels in color, color, color. The Bay of Georgia is "a deep violet or a warm purplish gray in tone." Where the Fraser river enters this bay it resembles "broad ribbons of palest old rose crinkled over waves of silvery amber silk." Who would not have loved to travel with this poetic word artist! She is all sense of perception and feels the "velvety pressure of the winds." No wonder she is surprised that certain unfeeling persons (mostly women) ever make the voyage to Alaska. They can think of nothing but a whale or an Indian basket, or totem poles, and say, "Do you play 500?" Compared to these, Mrs. Higginson enjoyed every pearly cloud, every purple water-mile, and every thrilling scent blown from the fir-clad mountains.

Ella Higginson has what may be called a panoramic literary perspective. Place her in an expanse of ocean, bordered with mountains, hung with mists, and flung with clouds, and she revels in glorious successions of expletives—a verbal picture show.

Of the school of the early seventies, when the influence of Poe, Bryant and Sam Simpson of Oregon still predominated, her thought is robed in sensuous beauty. Besides this gift her "Alaska" is set in the beautiful framework constructed only by a lover of nature. Hear her explanation of the influence that calls you back to Alaska or Oregon or any scene where land and ocean combine to produce scenes of beauty: "It is the pleading of the mountains and the pleading of the sea woven into one call and sent floating down laden with the sweetness of the splendid spaces."

Chapter two deals with the explorers, and has a bit of romance about the moribund marriage of the Prince of Wales with a daughter of a sailor.

Chapter three takes up the history of the Alaskan occupation by Russia, the Russo-English treaties, and the American acquisition. It also explains what few people know, why the American government did not secure what is known as British Columbia. Chapter twelve takes you into the beautiful canyon of Ketchikan, over which she raves in mad music of words that form pictures after picture of that beautiful gorge: "Her breath was as sweet as wild roses covered with dew. Always and everywhere the music of the wild sweet voices of a catenets floated up to us."

Mrs. Higginson's literary work has the quality of translating you into the country she describes. You smell the air, feel the touch of the velvety grass on the hills, and experience Alaska sensations and atmospheric effects.

Interlarded with the history of Alaska, the various occupations, are romances, descriptions of industries, as mining and fisheries, hunting, volcanoes, glaciers, mountains and native races. The book is well illustrated and printed by the Macmillan Company, New York.

"ZAZA."

The other four acts also offer abundant opportunities for original ideas in the way of scenery and stage setting, and "Zaza" from a scenic standpoint alone promises to be of unusual importance.

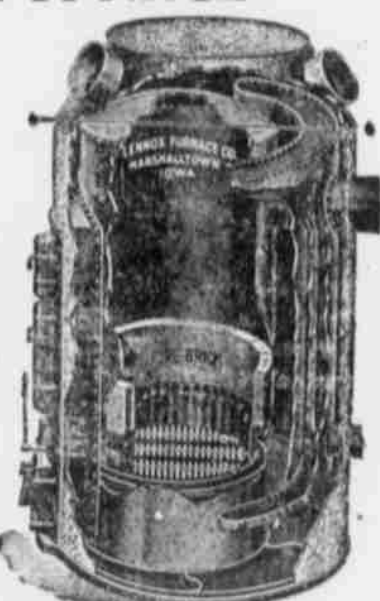
