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TERRIFIC BLIZZARD SWEEPS OVER ALASKA

Nome, Alaska, Jan. 4.—One of the worst blizzards that has ever swept over Bering peninsula is raging at the present time and it is feared that several men have been lost. At least a few lives have been given up to the storm king.

Harry Cox, a miner, left Solomon 10 days ago and has been missing ever since. A searching party of several men have been out night and day looking for him, but he is now given up for lost. A driver for W. A. Rowe, with a four-horse team, transferring a mining outfit to Seattle Creek, has not been heard of for two days although searching parties

have gone over the marked trails. A message has been received from Keweenaw saying the ice has crushed the wharf at that place.

The inshore wind which has been blowing here for many hours has caused an extremely high tide. Ice threatens many of the buildings on the water front in this city. Four Eskimo sealers who were far out at sea were cast adrift when the wind broke up the ice floes. They soon became invisible and, as rescue was impossible, it is conceded they either perished on account of the cold or were lost in an effort to gain the shore.

CITY NEWS

Davis Indicted.
M. G. Davis, indicted on charge of lewd cohabitation was arraigned this morning and given until tomorrow morning in which to plead.

Adams Says Not Guilty.

H. E. Adams, who was arrested by the police last week on the charge of larceny from a dwelling, and was indicted on the charge by the grand jury, was arraigned this morning before Judge Burnett and through his attorney, L. G. Heisel, plead not guilty.

Had Talkfest Anyway.

Owing to the absence of H. W. Stone, the principal speaker who was to deliver an address at the Y. M. C. A. rooms yesterday afternoon, the scheduled meeting was not held as was intended. However, about 30 men attended, and a general talkfest was held instead and with short talks and songs the afternoon was passed pleasantly.

The Jap Deported.

C. Yashita, the Japanese who was indicted by the grand jury on the charge of carrying about deadly explosives to the danger of the public, was ordered deported to Japan this morning by the court.

T. Iwasaki, a local Japanese miner studying at the Kimball college aided materially in procuring the funds with which to deport Yashita. Iwasaki solicited money from both the Japanese in Salem and in Portland and succeeded in procuring \$70, a sufficient sum to send the Jap home. Had it not been for the Jap-

anese minister taking direct action in Yashita's case, he would in all probability have been sent to the penitentiary.

Warden Curtis, of the penitentiary accompanied Yashita to Seattle today, and upon their arrival at that city, he will place his charge on board a Japanese vessel bound for his native shores.

The New Naturalization Process.

Government Examining Officer Smith, who investigates petitions for naturalization, under a recent law, appeared before Judge Burnett today in the examination of petitioners for naturalization. J. Wright was admitted to citizenship, being a resident of Polk county. Owing to the fact that Wrightman resided in another county, the examiner thought he would be compelled to raise an objection but could allow the recognition of the papers, however. Hanna Kencela was given naturalization papers without question. Samuel Statter, another resident of Polk county was admitted, but the examiner wished the same objection granted as in the former case. Hereafter Judge Burnett will instruct all the clerks in his judicial district not to issue petitions for naturalization to residents outside of the county in which they are making their home, and in this manner do away with the necessary objections of the government examiner. The present cases were the first to come up in the Marion county court, and the main objection of the examiner is based on not sufficient publicity of the petitioner under such circumstances.

EACH ACCUSES OTHER OF KILLING MANN

Denver, Colo., Jan. 4.—John Harry Dale, accused of the murder of Volly Mann, in a lonely canyon in Western Nebraska, today, while en route to Ogallala, where he will answer for the crime, declared that his wife and not himself fired the shot that killed Mann.

Smith declared that Mrs. Smith, who is being held as a witness against him, urged him to kill Mann so that they might possess the dead man's camp outfit.

He says that he refused to listen to her evil suggestions, whereupon she seized his revolver and shot Mann through the head. He then assisted her to bury the body.

The death of Mann was revealed recently by Mrs. Smith, who told the officers of the hidden place of the corpse. She then accused her husband of the murder, and he was taken into custody.

LITTLE COMPANIONS LET THE BABY DROWN

Fruitvale, Cal., Jan. 4.—That his 4-year-old son, Edward, fell into a pool of water while his companions, who were only a few years older, continued in happy play around the drowned boy was learned by Edward R. Gallagher, who today is investigating the circumstances surrounding the death of his child.

Gallagher spent the greater part of yesterday in search for the little one, when he came on him in the water.

Percy Plympton, seven years old, finally told the distracted father that the baby was in the water, but that he and his companions had paid no attention to the child's struggles. All of the children were too young to realize the danger.
