INSURGENTS DEFEATED MARTIN HOLDING UP NORTH WINTER

The insurgents in the City Council defeated Jas. Martin for Street Commissioner in the second conference Monday night. The mayor presided, and two new candidates were presented. Mr. Grenbaum nominated, R. O. Donaldson and Mr. Low nominated Jeff Pooler. On final ballot Pooler got eight of the fourteen votes and was elected.

North Winter Held Up.
Mr. Stolz of the street committee was ready to report on North Winter street. The city engineer has reported favorably on that improvement and that report was referred to the street committee. The contractors were present and so were abutters. Mr. Hill of the Fifth ward offered a resolution that the contractors be required to keep the street in repair as it has broken through in several places. This was referred to the street committee and they will investigate and "report on the report" of the city engineer. The street is not satisfactory to the people who are asked to pay for it.

Kick from the Fourth.
Mr. Sauter handed in a resolution for the repair of about twenty crosswalks in his end of the ward, and while he did not say anything it was evident from the disgusted look on his face that he does not think very much of the way streets have been looked after in his neighborhood. Jeff Pooler has been a road supervisor and has been hired by other people to superintend grading and such work, and with proper support and organization will be able to make a success of his job.

Propose New Rule.
Two important ordinances were handed in without any alderman fathering them, and Mr. Hofer asked who introduced them. Nobly responding he inquired if important bills could be brought before the council and no one be permitted to know where they originated? Mayor Rodgers said under the rules of the council that could be done. Mr. Hofer gave notice of an amendment to the rules requiring the author of any bill, resolution or amendment to this city laws to introduce the same over his name. The rule will come up for action at the next meeting.

Portland, Or., Jan. 5.—Investigation today revealed the fact that gophers, boring holes in the ground near Echo, on the Oregon Railroad & Navigation railroad, almost caused a serious wreck on that road yesterday.

It was shortly after midnight when a heavy engine pulling a west bound train struck a depression in the track, the bump in the rail instantly uncoupling the engine from the cars and setting the air-brakes. It developed that water running down the gopher holes had softened the ground under the road bed, until the rails sank for nearly a foot in one place.
