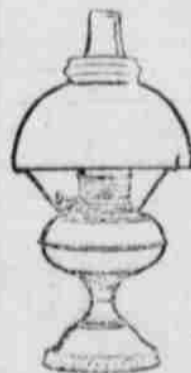

THESE ARE SLATED FOR TAFT'S CABINET

New York, Jan. 5.—The New York Tribune today prints what it claims to be President-elect Taft's final cabinet slate. With the exception of the attorney generalship, for which no one is mentioned, the Tribune declares the cabinet, when finally made up, will be as follows:
Philander C. Knox, secretary of state; John J. Mitchell, president of the Illinois Trust and Savings bank,

Chicago, secretary of the treasury; Frank H. Hitchcock, postmaster general; George Von Meyer, secretary of the navy; Luke Wright, secretary of war; William Loeb, commissioner of commerce and labor; R. A. Ballinger, secretary of the interior.
Secretary Wilson, the story says, will hold his position at the head of the agricultural department. The Tribune declares it publishes this slate on excellent authority.

SOCIETY LEADERS TIRE OF EACH OTHER

San Francisco, Jan. 6.—Mrs. Chas. E. Paxton, wife of the well-known society man and stock broker, will sue for divorce, according to the announcement of her attorney, Samuel M. Shostridge, today. The action will be brought on the grounds of extreme cruelty.

Among the allegations of the complaint, according to friends, Mrs. Paxton will claim that her husband threatened her by flourishing a revolver.

The news of a break between the Paxtons came with the separation of the couple. It is said that Paxton complained that his wife was spending too much money for clothes and, following a difference of opinion on that point, a separation followed.

SNOW
According to the official weather report at the O. R. & N. steamboat office in this city, the present snow storm surpasses all since the year

1892, when there fell a foot and four inches of the beautiful. The present snowfall in this vicinity has reached the 10-inch mark, which will probably be the limit. The majority of the snow storms heretofore in Salem were accompanied by a quiet south wind, but the storm yesterday was carried into the city by a strong breeze from the north, which was stinging cold.

Monday night's register of the temperature was 22 degrees above, but this morning the mercury stood at 19. This morning sleet fell for some time.

The Willamette river at this point has continued to rise at a fairly good rate and stands at five feet. Should there be a warm wind and rain the river men predict a record-breaking high water.

The Spaulding Lumber Co. was compelled to discontinue operations at 10 o'clock yesterday morning on account of the snow becoming so deep. The workmen were unable to handle the trucks.

The big Oregon Electric cars suf-

fered the greatest difficulty as the result of the snow clogging the machinery underneath the cars, so that they could hardly be kept moving. The cars could make no regular running time, for, in attempting to do so, the snow would cling to the wheels which would throw it up in the power machines under the car.
